

B. H. SPRINTER WINS CENTURY; MAKES 10 PTS.

St. Joe Ponies 3rd in Class 'D';
Rahn Leads Bears To 'B'

Upper Win

Twin city high school track teams could receive a successful season today. St. Joseph's Bears having registered for state in Class B of the state meet at East Lansing Saturday.

Competing the picture St. Joseph's Catholic Ponies, in their first year of state competition, placed third in Class D. Coach Raymond Thayer who was assisted by Ed Haddock placed first in a strong Class A field of 26 teams. Steve Rahn won in Class A with 34 1/2 points. Rosenfield finished in Class D.

Outstanding individual of the meet from a local standpoint was Bert Cooper, emotional sprinter and jumper who accumulated 100 points for St. Joe. He placed first in the 100-yard dash, fourth in the 100-yard jump and sixth in the 200.

Cooper's winning time in the 100-yard dash (16 1/2) was 10 seconds flat. Not in the running trail to and Willie Hayward of Muskegon had been clocked in 11 in a previous photo finish which the judge had given to Hayward.

In the 100-yard jump Bert had fouled on three jumps which accounted for winning distance of 10 feet 10 inches. Coach officials had measured a jump of over 22 feet. The 100-yard jump effort was only 20 feet, 8 inches. Only three competitors better 11 1/2 to 1 1/2 points for the meet.

Coach Arthur J. Thayer could not afford to lose a point and vault and was estimated at 11 feet, 8 inches. J. Hayward of Monroe accounted for the only shattered Class A mark by winning the event at 22 feet, 4 1/2 inches. Leslie Hartman and Jim Hutchinson, wing and quarter mile runner for the Bears, who finished out of the running.

Head Coach Earl Hargrave.

Coach Arnold Kautzer's Bears, 10th in all their dual meets had come out of the regional title by a fraction of a point. At St. Joe, Hargrave was victorious in taking 20 points for first place in state competition. Mike was three points with 24, while Kautzer's State High had 21.

Victory was an unexpected coach. Kautzer had even started home without waiting on state his long cross, of the Bears. He won 8 and honor in 1935.

Rahn Leads St. Joseph

Rahn was the St. Joseph athlete who scored himself in taking a pair of second places behind the highly heralded Ed Mead of East Lansing in the 100-yard dash. Who was clocked in a strong wind at 18 in the century and 19 in the 100-yard dash. He had no trouble in winning, but each time Rahn was a good second.

Bill Warden accounted for eight points as he placed third in the 100 and two hundred yards. Steve of Wayne and Rosenfield of M.C. finished respectively. Winning time for the high school was 18 1/2 and 21 1/2 for the race.

Phil Hopkins managed to get only a third in the mile run at Brockport of M.C. letters was and Frank of Brockport was second, each getting past him on the final lap. The time of 8:21 was slower than Hopkins' original mark, a better one compared St. Joseph's points by trying for second in the high jump with four others.

The only record holder in Class B was a mighty shot, pol Davis of 83 feet, 3/4 inches by Brockport of Wayne.

Points Finish Third

The St. Joseph Ponies raised up 30 1/2 points in taking third in Class D. Ed Mead, Rosenfield finished with 42 and the Michigan School for the Deaf with 25.

Ed Mead showed five points as he used with two others for first place as 10 feet in the pole vault. Rosenfield placed third in the mile run and the relay team accounted for third in the final event while Brockport came through with a close second in the 400-yard race.

Others gathering points for the Bears were: Shortman who led for fifth with Valley of St. Mary's in the 100-yard dash and who finished fifth in the 100-yard dash and sixth in the shot put.
