

**CLASS D TITLE
GOES TO BATH**

**Battle Creek Wins Class A
Crown and East Grand
Rapids in Class C**

East Lansing high school won the track and field championship of the lower peninsula in class B at Michigan State college Saturday as over 700 high school boys paraded through an all-day program.

The Trojans compiled a total of 36 11-12 points to not only head their class but to out-score all other teams in the annual championships of the state association. Battle Creek, Five-A league champion, won the Michigan honors in Class A with 26½ points. The Class C title went to East Grand Rapids with 23, and little Bath high school earned the Class D championship with 35½ points, a total that compared favorably with the mass of points rolled up by Coach Lynn C. Adams' victorious Trojans.

Runner-up to Battle Creek was Grand Rapids South with 21 5-6, to East Lansing was Kalamazoo State with 21, to East Grand Rapids was Leelanau with 21½, and Michigan School for the Deaf at Flint was second to Bath with 31 13-18.

Eight New Records Set

The athletes went on a record-breaking spree, establishing eight new records and equalling two others. The day's top performance was the 4:28.2 mile run by Ralph Blackrog of Mt. Morris in Class B, the fastest time for the distance ever turned in by a Michigan school boy. It eclipsed the mark of 4:39.8

The records equalled were the :22.9 time for the 200 yard low hurdles in Class A by Russell Reader of Dearborn, and the 11 foot 6 inch pole vault by Jay DeCou of Marine City in Class C.

Lansing's two Class A schools, Central and Eastern, qualified few entries for the meet. Eastern finished far down the list with 8 5-6 points and Central accumulated five. Best performance of Lansing entries was turned in by Joe Betts of Eastern who put on a terrific spurt in the stretch to win the second race in 2:04.2.

Lansing School for the Blind scored 12 points in Class D. Johnny Moorhead was the star of this team, as usual.

Trojan Team 'Unbeaten'

The East Lansing victory topped off an undefeated season in dual and all other competition. Mainly on the strength of two events, the 120 yard high hurdles and the broad jump, the Trojans compiled its winning margin. These two events netted 20 points. Jack Dodge was second in the high and Vern Sharp was third. Sharp later was second in the 200 yard low. Dick Wheeler was second in the 440. Bo Miller was fifth in the 220. Ray Dygert tied for third in the pole vault, and Warren Eldridge tied for fifth in the high jump. The Trojan relay team of Phil Emmons, Harry Publow, Dick Wheeler, and Miller missed first place behind Fremont by one-tenth of a second in 1:34.

The outstanding individual of the day was Bert Copeland, the colored boy from Benton Harbor, who scored three victories in Class A. He won both the dashes and the broad jump, becoming the first triple winner since Bill Watson was starring for Saginaw. Walter Derby, the Fremont star, piled up 15 1/2 points to lead that division.

Balance rather than individual brilliance stood Bath in good stead just as it did East Lansing. The little Clinton county school piled up points in the shot put, both hurdles, the dashes, the broad jump and the relay. Zeeb scored the team's only victory when he won the low hurdles.
