From the sea of mud that was Dort field, Mt. Morris boys and Beecher girls in Class B and Mt. Morris St. Mary boys in Class C emerged splotched with rain Friday as successful defenders of their respective championships in the annual Genesee county high school track and field meet.

When the field of athletes finally finished slipping and sloshing around, only Goodrich girls were among the missing from the 1939 title list. In their stead was Mt. Morris St. Mary as the new Class C girls leader.

Mt. Morris found it no great problem to defend its Class B title as it nearly doubled second place Fenton's total in winning with a point total of 62 3/7. Fenton had 33 3/7 with Davison close behind with 30 6/7. Grand Blanc came up fourth with 24 points.

In defending its championship, Mt. Morris St. Mary's boys found it hardly so easy as it finished with a lend of but 3 1/7 points over a pressing Hoover aggregation. St. Mary scored heavily in the broad jump and copped the relay in finishing with a 65 3/7 total to 62 2/7 for Hoover. Goodrich took third, but never was in on the championship fight, with 29 2/7 points.

Same as a Year Age

As a year ago, Beecher and Mt. Morris girls ran one-two in Class B with Beecher compiling 38 points. Mt. Morris garnered 24 and was followed by Bendle with 18.

With Helen Dobis showing the way with three firsts, Mt. Morris St. Mary rose up to take Goodrich in the girls Class C division. The Mt. Morris aggregation had 48 points to 33 for Goodrich. Montrose took third with 17.

Ralph Barlow, Hoover ace, upped his own record in the Class C pole vault from 9 feet 8 inches, to 10 feet ¾ inch.

Two other marks toppled in the boys' Class C division. Harold Flynn, Hoover, slashed 15.8 seconds off his 1939 record in running the mile in 4:47.8. Doyle Lyman, Montrose raised his shot put record from 38 feet, 8 inches, to 40 feet, 5½ inches.

The other three marks were created in the girls' Class B division. Phyllis Austin of Bendle increased her basketball throw mark from 79 feet, 8 inches, to 87 feet, 3 inches, Jeanette Dobbs tossed the shot 32 feet, 10% inches, for another new mark while Helen Brooks of Fenton set a new standard of 31 feet, 8 inches in the hop, step and jump. Betty Pearce of Beecher equaled the standing broad jump mark of 7 feet, 11 inches.

St. Mary took five firsts of a possible 12 in Class C, while Hoover took four, Rene Labraniere accounted for St. Mary firsts in both the dashes and also the broad jump. Barlow of Hoover was a dual winner in the high jump and vault. Andy Kohan of Goodrich took both the hurdle events.

In the Class C girls division, St. Mary won six of the seven first places. First places in the Class B girls events were well divided with the Beecher champions winning only two events, but taking four seconds to boost their total.
