## Cincy Hurlers' Record Points To No-Hitter

## Peppel 4th In Mile And Posts Best Time Of Year

Bert Copeland's perfect season against high school 100-yard dash competition was spoiled Saturday in a special event of the Michigan A. A. U. track meet at Kalamazoo.

Away to a poor start, he was beaten by a scant two feet by Robert Bodoh, Dearborn senior whom he had outsped a week previous in the state interscholastic. The 10.1 time was slower than the 10 flat a week ago. Bodoh came back a little later to place fourth in the open 100 against Michigan's Allan Smith, Gerritt Stukkie of Western State and Warren Breidenbach of Michigan. The time was 9.9. Copeland was not entered in this division.

Copeland was off top form in the open 220 and broad jump events, also, but he managed to place fifth in the furlong and sixth in the broad jump. Smith of Michigan won the 220 in 21.2 ahead of Breidenbach, Stukkie and Clark (Michigan Normal). Grant of Wayne was sixth. In the morning Copeland had finished second to Smith in the fastest heat at 21.7.

Bill Watson, formerly of Michigan, won the broad jump at 23 feet, 9 1/2 inches. Copeland could hit only 21 feet, 6 inches. Watson also won the shot at 50 feet, Maurice Hofmeister of Benton Harbor finding the heavier 16-pound weight too heavy and failing to qualify at 37 feet.

## Peppel Fourth In 4:35

Albert Peppel, Benton Harbor miler, came through with his best performance of the season to take fourth in the special high school mile behind Ralph Brackrog of Mt. Morris, Jay Woolsey of Jackson and Hart of Mt. Morris. The winning time was 4:29.4, while Peppel was clocked in 4:35.8 and paced the field for two laps. It was more than five seconds under his best previous time. Paul Kreier of St. Joseph finished sixth in the six-man field.

St. Joseph won third place medals in the mile relay as only that many teams entered. Phil Hopkins, Dan Mather, Jack Hickman and Bill Pickinger made up the team which finished behind Beginaw and Niles.

Frank Pate, Benton Harbor unattached, finished last in the open 880-yard run.

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
