

Police Finish Second, U-M Takes Third

4 Records Are Set
Despite Uncertainty
of Footing; Huber
and McCarthy Star

The Detroit Police and Michigan Normals had more advanced records than either the happy Detroit Tigers or the Michigan Normals. The two teams, experts on a ticked board of the University of Michigan, took part in the annual Michigan Amateur Athletic Union meet today. And as the Detroit Police captured honors by taking the team championship, it was a big surprise even though Coach Eddie O'Leary's team was the defending AAU champion.

The Police finished with 123 points in all for the Police and 117 for Michigan. It looked like a foregone conclusion for a while and Normals ran off with four of the six places and 17 points in the intermediate race.

4 Records Made.
Very surprising in one of the track operations was the fact that two were lost and all the times were quite satisfactory. Runners were gradually forced to feel their way around the many patches on the sticky track and their great runs were troubled throughout by uncertain footing.

The best performance was turned in by Joe McCarthy and Charles O'Brien, head of Normals, all that was McCarthy, of Detroit and general center Huber, of the Detroit Police.
