Newsom Fined \$5,000 by Briggs

Detroit—AP—The Detroit News said today that Louis Norman (Buck) Newsom, 1940 world series pitching hero of the Detroit Tigers, had been fined \$5,000 by Owner Walter O. Briggs for "fallure to get into proper condition."

Newson; was notified of the fine several days ago, the paper asserted. Two days ago the big right-hander was demoted from starting hurler and assigned to bullpen duty.

The News said the fine equals the highest ever assessed in baseball, Babe Ruth having paid the amount in 1925 when suspended by the New York Yankees for "general misconduct."

Records Tumble as Three New Champs Are Crowned the part of the par

One of the largest entries in the annual Genesee county track and field meet, 277 in all, gathered at Dort field Friday, and proceeded to establish three new divisional champions, recrown a successful defender and set 10 new records.

Taking six firsts, Fenton edged out the defending Class B titleholder, Mt. Morris, with 59.3 Hoover succeeded Mt. Morris

St. Mary as the Class C champion by an overwhelming margin, 79.5 to 36.5. Goodrich ascended the girls

Carl ing Ortman, James Phelps, William G Germain and Harold Flynn were out the quartet of Hoover stars that him ousted as many old records. Rene and LeFreniere of Mt. Morris showed of s his disregard for the record books by tying one mark and feat breaking another.

Ortman cleared the high jump bar at 5 feet 41/2 inches to better the mark set by Newman of Mt. Morris St. Mary in 1937 of 5 feet 1 inch. In the 120-yard for high hurdles, Phelps was clocked at :18.1 which was .6 of a second faster than the time turned in by Yerkey of Goodrich in 1938. Harold Flynn stepped off the mile run in 4:43.02 and this was more than four seconds faster than the record he set up last year in that event. Germain did the 880-yard run in 2:07.08 to break Whitetree's mark of 2:08.3 set for Hoover in 1939.

LaFraniere tied the record of :10.9 in the 100-yard dash and established a new mark of 20 feet 6 inches in the broad jump. The old record was held by Demick of Montrose with 19 feet 3% inches and was set in 1937.

The only Class B record in the boys division to be revised was the high jump and was accomplished by Willis McLaughlin of Mt. Morris with a height of 5 feet 9% inches. The old mark was held by Henderson of Clio with 5 feet 6% inches.

The commendable distance of 35 feet 8% inches was racked up by Beverly Upper of Grand Blanc in the girls class B shot put event to wipe out Dobbs' distance of 32 feet 10% inches set in 1940 for Fenton. The other new mark set in this division was the standing exc broad jump which was taken by Bettie French of Mt. Morris, who jumped 7 feet 11% inches. This was ¾ of an inch better than the record established by Pierce of Beecher last year.

A new shot put record of 29 feet 10% inches was turned in Wo by Betty Murphy of Mt. Morris rur St. Mary in the girls Class C division. The old mark of 28 feet 4¼ inches was held by Murphy of the same school in 1939. The girls Class C hop-step-jump mark was shoved up to 28 feet 10% inches by Jean Orr of Goodrich. This bettered by 5% inches the old record set by Dobis of Mt. Morris St. Mary last year.

Mt. Morris was forced into the runnerup slot in the Class B in group with 44.6 points while nin Grand Blanc was close behind in of third with 30.2. The remaining finishing order was Flushing, 18.3, Davison, 15.3, and Clio, 15.1.

Mt. Morris St. Mary took second in the boys Class C with 36.5 points to edge Goodyigh in third.

points to edge Goodrich in third place with 34.5 points. Swartz Creek finished last with 23 tallies.

High point medals in the meet went to Phelps with the largest total of 19 points, Nate Woodward of Fenton with 1314 tallies, Beverly Upper with 12 and for the third successive year, Helen Dobis was awarded the girl's Class B medal with 13 markers.

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
