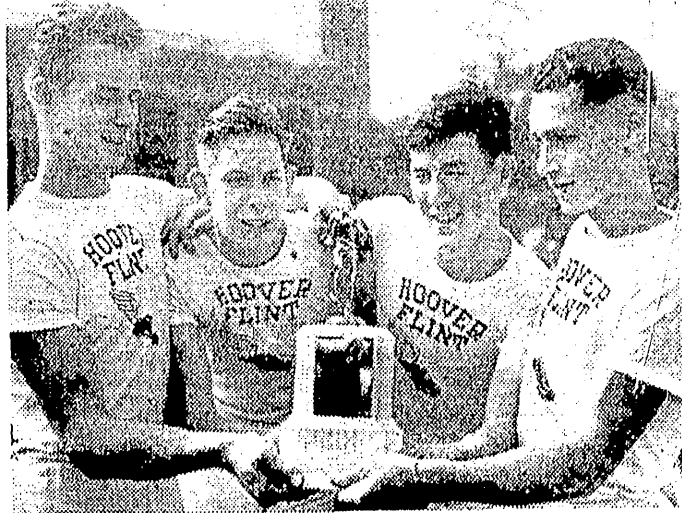

### Newsom Fined \$5,000 by Briggs

Detroit—AP—The Detroit News said today that Louis Norman (Buck) Newsom, 1940 world series pitching hero of the Detroit Tigers, had been fined \$5,000 by Owner Walter O. Briggs for "failure to get into proper condition."

Newsom was notified of the fine several days ago, the paper asserted. Two days ago the big right-hander was demoted from starting hurler and assigned to bullpen duty.

The News said the fine equals the highest ever assessed in baseball, Babe Ruth having paid the amount in 1925 when suspended by the New York Yankees for "general misconduct."

## Tigers' Veterans to Play Second Fiddle to the Kids

Detroit — AP — Manager Del Baker, seeking to get some oomph into the hot-and-cold Detroit Tigers, is going to let the club's veteran hurlers play second fiddle to the promising youngsters of the mound corps.

For a while at least, such old reliables as Louis Newsom, Lynwood Rowe and Tommy Bridges will toil in the bullpen while Johnny Gorslen, Harold Newhouser, Paul Trout and Floyd Glebell get the starting assignments.

Baker's strategy may or may not be what the American league champions need, but for a team whose pitchers are able to finish what they start in only one out of every three games it probably will have some effect.

Although the Bengals aren't so far behind the league-leading Cleveland Indians—in a virtual fourth place tie with the New York Yankees four games back—pitching isn't holding them up.

Detroit has played 49 games, winning 26, but—and here are the cold facts—in only 16 games has the starting hurler gone the route without assistance.

Gorslen, a 24-year-old right-hander, has been the most consistent, winning four and losing two. In those six games he needed relief only once.

Counting only complete games, Bridges has won three and lost one, Rowe one and one, and Newsom one victory. Gorslen, Bridges and Rowe each lost a full game by a 2 to 1 score.

Trout and Gorslen have been fine surprises, but Baker's use Friday of Glebell as a starting twirler backfired. Even after Glebell spotted the Washington Senators five runs Detroit went on to win the game 11 to 8, with Rowe the victor in a relief assignment.

Glebell, who became something of a hero when he bested Bob Feller at Cleveland in the game that clinched the flag for the Tigers, lasted one inning. He went out in the second after the Senators had placed their first five batsmen on base. Of three hits Glebell yielded, one was a homer by Catcher Jake Ealey with two aboard.

Rowe finally retired the side

after the Senators had scored six runs and, over the eight innings, allowed seven hits. In the last five innings he didn't let a base runner beyond first.

Detroit, aided by a three run-double by Bruce Campbell and four walks by starter Kendall Chase, tied the score at 7-7 in the third, and then came from behind to score three runs in the seventh and one in the eighth to take the game. Chase, who was followed in the box by Alejandro Carrasquel and Walt Masterson, was the losing pitcher.

Pat Mullin continued blasting the ball for the Bengals. The young center fielder whacked three hits for the second straight day. One of his blows was a triple.
