## Michigan Loses To OSU, 3-2

### Winning Marker Goes Across in Eleventh

Ann Arbor—AP—Ohio State pushed home the winning run in the 11th inning Friday to edge out Michigan's defending Big Ten champions, 3-2, and send the Wolverine vision of another clear-cut conference title spinning into dust.

In second place behind Iowa as the result of the setback, Michigan can do no better now than take a share of the title, and that can be accomplished only by defeating the Buckeyes here today.

Michigan came from behind twice to tie the visitors from Columbus, the second time in the ninth, only to lose when Carl Patterson doubled and raced home with the run that counted on Warren Scholler's hard single to center.

Irving Boll allowed two runs in nine innings, but then was lifted to permit Wayne Christiansen to pinch hit, a move that resulted in the second Wolverine run, which set the contest into overtime. Christiansen rapped out a one-bagger to right field, and Frank Higgins, who ran for him, stole second and scored on Don Holman's single to centerfield.

The winning run was scored off Mickey Fishman, who finished for Michigan, and was charged with the defeat.

John Lohrey gave up seven hits and two runs in nine innings for Ohio State and Bob Buckler kept the Wolverine bats equally as well tamed in the extra frames.

Michigan now has won nine conference games and lost two, while Iowa has won 10 and dropped two this was Ohio State's sixth win, against three defeats.

Coach Ray Fisher will send Mickey Fishman against the Buckeyes' Bob Buckler today.

In a day marked by the smashing of 18 Genesee county track and field records, Fenton successfully defended its boys' Class B championship and Beecher took its third straight girls' Class B title Friday at Dort field.

Neither 1941 Class C championship was able to repeat. Mt. Morris St. Mary succeeded Hoover in the boys' division, while Kearsley replaced Goodrich in the girls'.

In no division was the new champion hard pressed. Fenton scored 49 points to take Mt. Morris by 14 points with Grand Blanc finishing third with 30.

In the girls' B, Beecher scored 29½ points to 19½ for Flushing with Fenton third with 15.

Kearsley girls won title by the most convincing margin, scoring 60 points to 37 for Goodrich. In the boys' Class C, St. Mary took Kearsley, 51½ to 36½ with Hoover third with 32½.

Record breaking feats were divided equally between the boys and girls divisions, each setting nine new standards. Of the four records set in the boys' Class B, two were established by Nathan Woodward, Fenton, who ran to new records in the high and low hurdles and was the leadoff man on Fenton's record smashing half-mile relay team. Byron Lawson, Beecher, set the fourth record in this division with a leap of 10 feet, 11½ inches in the pole vault.

Two of the five marks set in the boys' Class C were turned in by Jack Jenkins, Kearsley, in the high and low hurdles. Jenkins turned in one of the day's best performances in the high hurdles when he ran them in 16.1, knocking two seconds off the old mark. George Esaak, Mt. Morris St. Mary, was another double record breaker, setting new marks in the two dash events and led off on St. Mary's record smashing relay team.

Esaak took the high point medal in Class C, while a recheck of Class B scores showed Lyle Brown, jr., of Clio, edged Woodward in this division.

Onakee Carpenter had a hand in setting two new girls' Class B records, lowering the 50-yard dash mark and running No. 1 on Flushing's relay team. Helen Pearce and Darby of Beecher set new marks in the standing broad jump and hop, step and jump, respectively, while Smith of Bendle set a new mark in the softball throw.

Betty Owen paced Kearsley with 15 points. She set new records in the hop, step and jump and standing broad jump as well as running on Kearsley's record breaking relay team. Price, also of Kearsley, set the fourth record in this division with a basketball toss of 73 feet, five inches.

## Yankees Wallop Senators, 16 to 1

### Ted Williams Clouts Two Home Runs

By AP—Lefty Vernon Gomez held the Washington Senators to four hits and made four himself Friday as the New York Yankees slashed their way to a 16 to 1 triumph. In piling up their biggest collection of runs this season and winning their 18th game in their last 21 starts, the world champions battered three Washington hurlers for 17 safeties, including home runs by Joe DiMaggio, Joe Gordon and Buddy Hassett, who also had three other hits.

Young Don Kolloway came up three times with the bases loaded and hit a double and two singles, driving in six runs and leading the Chicago White Sox to a 12 to 8 victory over the St. Louis Browns. The Browns scored six runs in the fourth inning but

the Sox came back with four in the eighth and five in the ninth. Ted Williams hit two home runs—one in the first with two on and the other in the eighth with the bases full—to drive in seven runs and pace the Boston Red Sox to an easy 14 to 2 victory over the Athletics at Shibe Park. The roundtrippers were Williams' 13th and 14th of the season.

Ed Head held the New York Giants hitless until Harry Danning punched a wasted single in the eighth inning, but he couldn't keep them from sneaking a run across in the seventh and Hugh Casey couldn't keep them from getting two runs in the 10th, either, to beat the Brooklyn Dodgers 3 to 1.

Rube Melton of the Philadelphia Nationals held Boston to six hits and a single unearned run as the Phils defeated the Braves 2 to 1. It was the third straight defeat for the Braves.

After falling the bases in the 11th inning, Joe Beggs walked Pinch Hitter Dominic Dallessandro to force in the winning run which gave the Chicago Cubs a 6-5 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.
