In second place behind Iowa as the result of the setback, Michigan can do no better now than take a share of the title, and that can be accomplished only by defeating the Buckeyes here today. Michigan came from behind twice to tie the visitors from Co-

lumbus, the second time in the ninth, only to lose when Carl Patterson doubled and raced home with the run that counted on Warren Scholler's hard single to center. Irving Boil allowed two runs in

nine innings, but then was lifted to permit Wayne Christiansen to pinch hit, a move that resulted in the second Wolverine run, which set the contest into overtime. Christiansen rapped out a one-bagger to right field, and Frank Higgins, who ran for him, stole second and scored on Don Holman's single to centerfield. The winning run was scored

off Mickey Fishman, who fin-ished for Michigan, and was charged with the defeat. John Lohrey gave up seven hits and two runs in nine innings for
