

QUAKERS TAKE CINDER CROWN

First Triumph Over Sexton Since 1940; Relay Decides Meet

Thursday afternoon at Michigan State college Eastern high school won its first city track title in three years.

Sprinting to a two-yard victory in the 880 relay the Quakers registered a 55-49 victory over Sexton. Its first cinder triumph over the Big Red since Joe Betts, Paul Cole and Tom McKee led Eastern to a 6½ to 4½ victory in 1940.

Thanks to a slam in the 880-yard run, and a surprise victory by Wendell (Bill) Roberts in the broad jump. Coach Howard Gleason's charges entered the relay just one point behind the favored east siders. Mike Martenucci got Sexton off to a good start, surging into a short lead on the opening lap of the baton gallop. Roy Howland protected Martenucci's lead on the second leg but at this point Ed Carlson of Eastern took over. The spindly-legged Carlson overtook Stewart Miller of Sexton on the north turn and edged into a two-yard lead which anchorman Pete Gibson successfully held despite a fine attempt by Dale Emerson of Sexton to close the gap.

Each team had a double winner. Emerson walked off with both hurdle events besides tying for second place in the high jump. His 12-point effort was the best individual performance of the day. Gibson of Eastern finished with 11½ points claiming victories in both dashes besides anchoring the relay quartet.

Yesterday's city title was the second gained by an Eastern athletic squad in two days. Wednesday the Quaker links team sewed up the golf championship with a five-stroke decision over Sexton at Groesbeck.
