

## Juniors Win Interclass Track And Field Meet

Led by Bob Crepeau, who scored 18 points, the juniors won the Escanaba high school interclass track and field meet at the Escanaba athletic field last week, scoring 90½ points to 68 by the seniors and 21 5-6 by the sophomores.

The meet was held over a four-day period and competitors were allowed to compete in as many events as they desired. Points were allowed for the first five places. The outstanding performances were recorded in the shot put, in which Bob Pfothenhauer heaved the metal ball 47 feet ¾ inch, and in the broad jump, in which Don Dufresne turned in a performance of 29 feet, 8 inches.

Crepeau won the high and low hurdles, tied for first in the high jump, scored third in the broad jump and fifth in the pole vault. Bill Anderson was second high point scorer with 16 points. Anderson won the quarter mile and

## HERO OF WASP TRIES BASEBALL

### Donald Patrick Pitching For York Team In Class C League

York, Pa., May 31 (AP)—A hero of the aircraft carrier Wasp now is this town's No. 1 baseball hero.

He's Lieut. (JG) Donald Patrick, former navy dive bomber pilot credited with sinking one enemy submarine in the Atlantic and three Japanese planes in the battle of the Pacific. He now is a starting pitcher for the York team in the Class C Interstate Baseball League.

"If I could throw like I once dropped bombs or fired a machine gun I'd be rolling right along in this game," he says.

He's hoping that the training he received as a dive bomber pilot will cure his tendency toward wildness and lead him to the major leagues.

Patrick, a resident of Cedarville, Mich., was honorably discharged from the navy last December 21 because of injuries received when the Wasp's powder magazines exploded and blew him overboard.

A few minutes earlier he had rushed down to the stricken ship's fourth deck and released a hatch
