The two touchdowns he scored in the City game last Fall gave him 11 for the season, and a total of 66 points for the best mark in the Valley. That season was climaxed by his achievement of being named on the Associated Press All-State eleven.

During the 1943 track season, Willie, the duration state champ in the high hurdles, saw the Regional-Valley laurels in that event go to his teammate, Leo but as an all-around scorer, Hamilton was the best in Valley track circles.
