Cooley Wins Track Title of West Side with 157 Points to Cheer Ill Coach

Cooley's track athletes paid a tribute to Claude Snarey, their coach who is seriously ill, Friday afternoon at U. of D. Stadium by winning the West Side meet of the City League's annual outdoor carnival.

The Cardinals not only won, they did it in very convincing fashion. By placing 27 boys in the finals the Cardinals piled up a total of 157 points, 79 more than the second place Redford team. Mackenzie finished in

third place, a single point behind Redford.

Although they piled up that huge margin the Cardinals captured only three first places. Hal Foster won the 440 in 54.5; Don Davis topped the 120-yard high hurdles in 15.4 to take that event and the relay team composed of John Witherspoon, Jr., Corky Englander, Gene Simescue and Howie Emmons, beat Mackenzie's team time by one-tenth of a second to take that event.

The Cardinals will have four boys in three events when the finals are run at University of Detroit Stadium next Wednesday. Three boys will be in two other events while at least one Cooley

runner will be in all of the rest of the twelve-event card.

Redford's team captured the most first places by coming home first in four events. Joe Metz finished No. 1 in the 330 while Fred Stolker came in the winner in the mile. Two field-event first places rounded out their total. Dick Brown won the shot-put, while Tom Clark topped the broad-jumpers.

Ted Kuhn was the only double-winner of the meet. The fleet Mackenzie runner finished in front in the 100 when he posted a 10.2-second time and also copped the 220, in 23.6 seconds. Bob Fraser gave the Stags another first place when he took the 120-yard low hurdles.

WEST SIDERS FASTER

Mackenzie finished in second place in the regular track events, but its failure to place in the military obstacle relay cost them the runner-up's spot.

On the basis of the two league meets it would appear that the West Side teams would be the winner of the title. The times in the events on Friday were much better than those turned in by the East Sider's Thursday afternoon. The mile was two seconds faster; the half mile nearly 10 seconds.

The shot-put winner on the West Side, Dick Brown, of Redford, tossed the iron ball nearly three feet farther than Harry Wickersham, the winner for Southeastern on the East Side. Only the high jump was the better mark. The East Sider posted 6 feet, 1 inch, while Luther Carter of Northwestern cleared 5 feet, 8.
