Saginaw added the outdoor Class A title to its indoor crown by scoring 29½ points, Central marked up 28½, Ann Arbor finished with 26½ after leading until the last event, and Battle Creek scored 23½.

Adair's spill was the second bad break for the Tribe Saturday. The first one occurred in the morning preliminaries

as Jesse Thomas arrived too late to compete in his qualifying heat and missed the finals. He had turned in 15.4 in the Regional, fastest time recorded in the State this season, and even a fifth in the finals would have given the Red and Blacks the grown
