Bradley Scores High Jump Win

Battle Creek Places 3 in Leap; Vaughn Fifth in Dash.

ANN ARBOR — (AP) — The cross-town rivalry between two Saginaw track teams, which for the past three years has featured the River Rouge Invitational relays, Saturday night was decided in favor of Saginaw Arthur Hill high school by less than two points in the class A division at Yost fieldhouse.

Arthur Hill, holder of the 1944 title and runner-up to Saginaw last year in the battle for unofficial state indoor track and field champion, racked up 37.3 points to Saginaw's 35.5.

In third place was Wyandotte with 29.2 points, while Muskegon (21), Flint Central (20.5) and Ann Arbor (19) finished in fourth, fifth and sixth places.

Do Well in Jump

Only in the high jump did Battle Creek high school performers live up to advance notice and in that event, all three of its entries broke into the scoring column, even though one of them, Owen Anderson, who figured in a 10-way tie for sixth place, picked up only a fraction of a point.

Big Bob Bradley took the event with apparent ease as he sailed over the bar at 5 feet, 10 1/2 inches with plenty to spare to beat Flint Northern's Moore for first place. Bob Ayers divided fourth and fifth place points with Maher of Midland as they tied for the fourth spot.

Battle Creek's only other points in the meet came in the 65-yard dash when Mendell Vaughn got a fifth place.

Romulus high school topped the class B-C-D division with 21.5, heading off both Allegan and Ecorse, which ended in a second-place tie with 19 points apiece. Alma and Ypsilanti Central tied for fourth with 17 1/2 points and Mt. Pleasant was sixth with 16.
