Saginaw Valley Schools Rule State Track Meet

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EAST LANSING—The Saginaw Valley Conference rules supreme along the Michigan high school track front.

With Saginaw High showing the way, four Valley squads placed among the first five teams in the State Class A championships staged before 2,000 waterlogged fans at Michigan State College.

THE TROJANS from Saginaw High successfully defended their team championship, compiling 36½

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points. Its cross-town rival, Arthur Hill, placed second with 28 points, followed by Muskegon with 24 points.

Two more Valley schools, Flint Northern and Flint Central, finished in a tie for fourth place with 15 points each.

Michigan School for the Deaf, of Flint, retained its Class D title but St. Joseph, in Class B, and Romulus, in Class C, were dethroned. Charlotte won the Class

B crown with 37 points while East Grand Rapids outsped a closely packed Class C field to win with 31 points.

THE TROJANS raced to their second straight State title by scoring in eight of the 12 events.

K. D. McKinnon won the shot-put with a heave of 47 feet 10¼ inches while **Marvin Cichowski** topped the 200-yard low hurdles in :23.6 to give Saginaw its only first-place winners.

Jesse Thomas, Flint Central's all-around star, won the high hurdles in :15.4. Thomas also won the broad jump with a leap of 21 feet 4¾ inches to become the only double winner in Class A.

Ulysses Rogers, of Ecorse, was a double victor in Class B, winning the century in :10:7 and the 220-yard dash in :23.6.

OTHER DOUBLE winners were Keith Gundrum, of Ypsilanti Roosevelt; Don Plonta, of Bayport, and Arlon Dennison, of Michigan School for the Deaf.

Detroit University School had two champions in Class C. Art Mushner won the 100-yard dash in :10.7 while **Bill Ghesquiere** threw the shot 46 feet 6¼ inches.

Bill Grigg, of Dearborn, retained his 440 title, turning in one of the day's best times, :52.7. George Smith, of Wayne, won the Class B shot put with a 48-foot 4¾-inch effort.

School for the Deaf had the closest call of the day, with a victory in the relay bringing the squad its second straight title.
