OSU Trackmen Break Old Jinx, Beating Wolverines by 67-55



for the Valley Conference Saturday on Michigan State's raindrenched oval as Saginaw High scored 36½ points to win the Class A State track title. Saginaw Arthur Hill placed next with 28, and the two Flint schools— Central and Northern-each tallied 15 points to share fourth place behind Muskegon, with 24.

In addition, Flint came away with two double winners in Jesse Thomas of Central and Arlon Dennison of Michigan School for the Deaf, while MSD boys took the Class D championship with a 52-point total that bested Baldwin by five points. MSD, like Saginaw, retained the title won a year ago.
In Class B, Charlotte took on-

ly one first but piled up 37 points against Fremont's 22 11-12 for second, and in Class C, East Grand Rapids coasted to an eight-point victory over Ypsi-lanti Roosevelt by scoring 31 points.
