

Saginaw Is Track Champ

Beats Out Arthur Hill to Retain State Crown

East Lansing—(U.P.)—For the second consecutive year, Saginaw High school dominates Michigan prep track and field competition.

The Saginaw squad repeated Saturday as class A champions as more than 700 high school athletes sought individual and team honors at Michigan State college field.

Heavy rains preceding the annual track carnival made the cinder oval soggy while intermittent showers hampered athletes and prevented any new record per-

formances.

Saginaw successfully defended its class A title, scoring 36½ points. Saginaw Arthur Hill finished second with 28, Muskegon was third with 24, Flint Central and Flint Northern tied for fourth with 15 each and Jackson was sixth with 14½.

St. Joseph failed to repeat as class B titlists, finishing seventh, while Charlotte's strong team went ahead to win with 37 points. Fremont was second with 22 11/12, Ecorse third with 18 1/6, Birmingham fourth with 17½ and Niles fifth with 11 7/12.

East Grand Rapids captured class C laurels with 31 points. Other top class C scores were: Ypsilanti Roosevelt 23, Romulus 21½, Grand Rapids Wyoming 16½, and Rockford 16. Romulus was the defending champion.

Michigan School for the Deaf of Flint successfully defended its class D title although strongly challenged by Baldwin. The two teams dominated the lower class meet. Michigan School for the Deaf won with 52 points while Baldwin was second with 47. Bloomfield Hills finished third with 21. Baroda fourth with 20½ and New Buffalo fifth with 17.

While no records were set, Alan Hosler, Milan, missed breaking the state class C mile record by only .5 second with a sparkling 4:35.6 over the sloppy course.

Four preps shared individual honors, each winning two events. They were Jesse Thomas, Flint Central, first in the class A broad jump and 120-yard high hurdles; Ulysses Rogers, Ecorse, first in the class B 100 and 220 yard dashes; Arlon Dennison, Michigan school for the Deaf, first in the 100 and 220-yard dashes in class D, and Don Pienta, Bay Port, first in the class D high jump and broad jump.
