Kearsley wound up third. Howe, the hurdling half of the brother act, was the meet's individual ace with 11 11/28 (that's right) points. He won the highs and lows, anchoring the relay, and adding 1/7 of a point in the high jump. After setting school hurdles marks of 16.6 and 24.1, he lugged the baton across at 1:39.9 in the relay win that erased Kearslev's last hope. erased Kearsley's last hope.

John wasn't the whole show as other winners were George Howe with 4:47.3 in a muddy mile, Vince Harrison in the century, Allen Gale in one 440, and Franks. Two more Tigers figured in a four-way deadlock for pole vault laurels.

Lone winner for the runnerup team was Ward Powers in the high jump. Flushing, despite firsts by Harry Bedford, Earle Ormiston, and Lee St. John, got only a tie for fourth. The team scored 23 1/7 points, equalled by Mt. Morris with two winners, as third-place Grand Blanc had only a share of a first in 28 2/7 points. Only other scores were points. The girls champion, decided multaneously, was Kearsley simultaneously, was Kearsley with a 4-3 margin in firsts and a 46½ to 38 point advantage over Grand Blanc. Kearsley's Joyce Jenkins led the girls, winning the 60-yard dash and the broad jump. All five teams tallied points, the other scores being 11½ for Flushing, 4 for Beecher, and 2 for Davison.

Hogan Perils Goodall Mark

Texan Has' 11-Hole Lead in Round-Robin

Mamaroneck, N. Y .- UP-Ben Hogan, the little man who never cracks a smile during business hours, threatened today to turn the \$10,000 Goodall Round-Robin Golf Tournament into an utter rout with the show less than half completed.

The poker-faced Texan began his fourth round with an 11-hole lead over 14 of the finest players in the game and the all-time Goodall record set by Harry Cooper in 1939 already was in sight.

Picking up 15 points in two rounds over the soggy turf at Winged Foot Golf Club Friday, Hogan had a total of 25 holes to his credit as he headed out with two of the soft touches of the tournament—E. J. (Dutch) Harrison and British Open Cham-

pion Dick Burton. Cooper's tournament record is 31 holes for seven rounds, only six more than Hogan has compiled in three.

Milling around behind Hogan were Herman Barron of White Plains, N. Y., who had 14 holes to his credit, Byron Nelson of Toledo, Ohio, with plus 13, Harland McCredon of Sanford Me old McSpaden of Sanford, Me., plus 11 and Lloyd Mangrum of Los Angeles, plus 10.

The rest were scattered far below and out of contention.

Nelson, who drove within two points of Hogan on the morning round Friday, led the field off the tee today against Sam Byrd (minus 18) and McSpaden, Burton (minus 29), Harrison (minus 8) and Hogan followed. Next in order were Jimmy Demaret of Houston (minus 1), Barron and Herman Keiser, Akron (plus 2); Bob Hamilton of Chicago (minus 11), Mangrum and Jimmy Hines (minus 4); and Lawson Little (even), Sam Snead of Hot Springs, Va., (minus 5) and Vic Chezzi Knowille, Tonn (chez
