

# Cooley Trackmen Eye Fifth 'Grand Slam'

Coach Claude Snarey, who makes a habit of turning out track champions at Cooley High, will go after his fifth "grand slam" when the Wayne Relays are held June 2 at Denby.

Cooley added to its cross-country and indoor titles this season by easily capturing the Metropolitan League outdoor meet yesterday at Redford. The Cardinals amassed 53 points, outclassing Northwestern, which had 35½ points for second.

Redford was third with 32½ points, followed by Denby with 23½, Miller 22, Mackenzie 18, Perslung 13½, Northern 13, Hamtramck 12½, Cass Tech 9, Southeastern 7, Western 5½, Northeastern 3, Southwestern 2, and Central 2.

Cooley virtually won the meet in the first event, the high hurdles, when Don Harrower and Bill Terrian finished one-two. In the lows, the Cardinals did even better, as Harrower, Gordon Brown

and Terrian took the first three places.

That gave Cooley 26 points in the hurdles, half its total. Bob Hahn won the mile and Bob Smith the pole vault to pile up the margin.

Tommy Stewart, Denby High flash, failed to break the city records in the 100 and 220 dashes, but won the events handily, despite an ailing arm. Running against the wind, he hit 10.1 seconds in the 100 and the 220 in 22.5.

Stewart saved the biggest thrill for the last event, the half-mile relay. Taking the baton on the anchor leg 20 feet behind Sylvester Norman of Northwestern, Stewart caught the Colt runner on the turn and won by five feet. It gave Denby a tie for first with Redford in the event.

Cooley's monopoly in the low hurdles was matched by Northwestern in the half mile. Jim Henry won the race, followed by two teammates, Stan McConner and Allen Tellis.

High individual scoring honors went to Gordon Cronk, of Redford. He won the broad jump, took second in the 220, a third in the 100 and ran on the Huskie relay team for 16½ points.
