others were tied.

Saginaw continued its Class-A domination of state prep circles with a narrow victory over Jack-son. Ypsilanti again was the Class-B winner but Dundee came strongly to the fore in Class-C-D to stop Ypsilanti Roosevelt, defending champion, which had to be content with second place. It was the third consecutive team title for Saginaw and for Ypsilanti. Roosevelt had been the C-D champion the

past two seasons. Pioneers Are Sixth

Disappointing to local fans was the showing of Ann Arbor High's Pioneers who finished in sixth place. A dropped baton cost the Pioneers plenty, however, as they were leading their section of the Class-A relay in the third leg when the mishap which kept them from even placing occurred. Those lost relay points would have put Ann Arbor higher on the list of final finishers. Ann Arbor's Mark Ford supplied the Pioneers' only first-place points as he won the 65-yard low hurdles in 7.7 seconds to tie a Class-A mark set by Jackson's Horace Smith in 1941 and equalled on several other occa-

Final meet results hint a warning for Ann Arbor's Coach Tim Ryan and for Roosevelt's Coach Art Walker so far as their own league, championship meets are concerned, Jackson's second-place concerned, Jackson's second-place finish in Class-A Saturday means Ryan must worry a bit about re-peating as Five-A titlist. Mead earned only six points but broke the Class-A record in the high jump with a leap of six feet, two and three-eighths inches. The versatile Hill, who will enroll at Michigan next fall,
