FLINT LEADING—The State Class A Track Meet turned into an inter-city affair again here Saturday, Saginaw High winning four first places and figuring in 10 of 15 places for a winning 44-point total and Arthur Hill collecting 25 1/4 points in four events for runner-up honors.

This title was the fifth straight for Coach Herb Korff's Trojans and was an easy one. Kalamazoo was third with 28 3/8 points, followed by Jackson (18), Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills (17 1/10), Dearborn Fordson (17) and Flint Northern (16). Flint Central finished in 18th place with five markers.

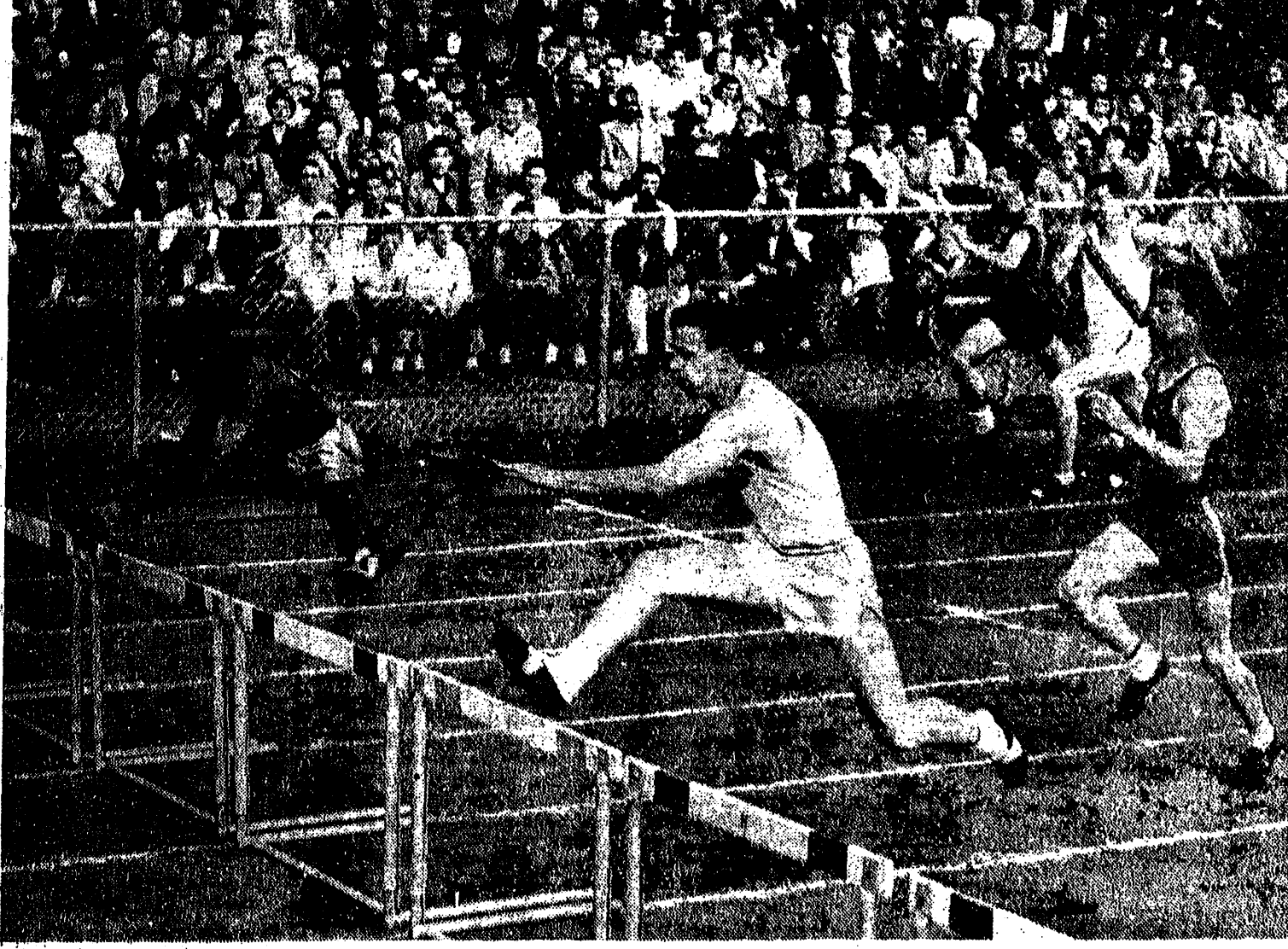

MSC Takes IC4A Title in Track

New York—AP—Horace Smith and Fred Johnson, two versatile Negro athletes, led Michigan State to victory Saturday in the IC4A outdoor track championship, completing a Spartan sweep of all the association titles.

It previously had won the indoor and cross country crowns. Smith won a brilliant double in the hurdles, taking the high in 14.3 seconds and the low in 22.9. Johnson successfully defended his championship in the broad jump with a leap of 24 feet 2 inches, was second by two inches to Smith in the low hurdles and third in 100 for high point man of the meet with 12.

Michigan State placed third in the broad jump and added a fourth in javelin throw. Michigan State piled up 44 points, Yale, defending champion, was second with 30 1/2. Other team leaders were New York University 29 1/2, Seton Hall 18, Cornell 15, Penn State 15, Harvard 12 and Syracuse 11.

Andy Stanfield of Seton Hall joined Smith as a double winner by taking both dashes, setting a new record of 20.8 for the 220. The old one was 20.7, set by Barney Ewell in 1941. He won the 100 in 9.8.

All told, four meet records were set in the 73rd annual competition of the oldest of all American track meets. Horace Ashenfelter of Penn State won the two-mile in 9:09.2, erasing the mark of 9:11.8 set by Curtis Stone, also of Penn State, in 1947.

Jim Fuchs of Yale won the shot with 56 feet 3/4 inches. The old mark was 55 feet 4 1/2 inches by the late Alfred Blozis of Georgetown, in 1942. Dick Phillips of Brown and Irving Mondscheln of NYU soared to a new mark of 6 feet 7 1/2 inches in a high jump tie, one inch over Mondscheln's own record made in 1948.

Michigan State piled up its points in the hurdles. Paige Christiansen, defending champion, was third in the high behind his teammate Smith, with Jim Gehring of Penn State second. In the low, Christiansen came in fifth, with Smith and Johnson out in front. Gehring was third.

Four champions out of 11 defended their titles successfully. Ashenfelter was a repeater from 1948, as was Mondscheln in the high jump. Victor Frank of Yale won the discus with 159 feet 6 1/2 inches, well behind his 1948 winning throw of 165 feet 8 1/2 inches. Arthur Sherman of Rhode Island State, who tied for first last year in the pole vault, tied again this year, this time with Nell King of Yale, at 13 feet.
