

Jenkins' Heave Tops State Mark

Miller High Shotputter Leads Thinclads in Romp over Cass Tech

Walter Jenkins, brilliant Miller High School weight-man, unofficially shattered the State high school shotput record Tuesday with a tremendous toss of 55 feet, nine inches.

Looming as a possible successor to the great Charley Fonville, present world record holder who also is a Miller product, Jenkins, easily surpassed the State record of 54 feet 7½ inches. It was set last year by Bob Carey, of Charlevoix, in the Class C state championship meet.

He also dwarfed the City League standard of 52 feet, ¾ inch set by Cass Tech's Ed Turaschoff in 1928.

NOT EVEN FONVILLE, whose world mark is 53 feet, ¾ inch for the 16-pound shot, approached Turaschoff's record toss while he competed under Coach Leroy Dues at Miller.

Fonville's best toss at Miller six years ago was 51 feet.

Dues, a stand-out shotputter in his collegiate days at Wayne, insisted that Jenkins still has a long way to go before he can approach Fonville.

"He's not steady and you never can tell just how far he will toss it. But he's coming along—and who knows?"

JENKINS' REMARKABLE feat was the highlight of Miller's 82½ to 21½ victory over Cass Tech over the Belle Isle track.

It was the third State record Detroit schoolboys have beaten in the last two seasons.

Northwestern's Stan McComor claimed the 440-yard dash mark at :49.8, Fletcher Glidens set a national indoor pole vault mark at 13 feet, 3½ inches recently, and now comes the City's first weight thrust since, well, even before Charley Fonville.
