Northwestern beaten by less than one point last year, came back to win the West Side title by 37 points.

Coach Russell's Colts seemed to be in every event of the 13 first places. Northwestern had eight of them plus two seconds and a host of thirds.

Tall, gangling Al William smashed all the hopes of Redford's Terry Iverson, when he literally ran Iverson's face off in the featured one-mile run.

Williams ran a very nice race to the time of 4:27.6; he played second fiddle to the Redford youngster for three turns of the smooth Sawyer Field course then on the last lap. Williams ran a startling 1:02 for the last quarter.

Iverson was nipped for second at the tape by Mackenzie's Jim Clarke. A slow 2:16 first half, where race strategy cut the pace, apparently ruled out a record run.

A show of the scoring power of the Colts was shown in the 440. Bill Barton and Jim Smith, both of Cooley, were favored to run one-two. Instead they were sandwiched between Northwestern's Ray Tucker and Gene Elzyl Tucker won in the good time of :51.8.

Joe Howard, Northwestern's best hurdler, pulled another upset when he soundly whipped Don Rebtoy in the 12° yard low hurdles. Howard also won the high hurdles. Joe's time for these events were :13.4 for the lows and :15.3 for the high.

Central's Bill Lofton sprinted to victory in both sprints. Lofton's time was :10.3 and :22.9.

The 880 yard run was a thriller between Northwestern's Winston Blount and Cl'ff Hatcher of Central. Hatcher had the lead for 660 yards. Then Blount, who also is a crack sprinter, opened up and when and Hatcher turned for home they were neck and neck. With less than 25 yards remaining the boys came thundering down the track, both Blount and Hatcher leaped for the tape. The verdict was Hatcher: his time was 2:00.6.

With the East Side and Miller meets over, automatically Miller and Northwestern are the favorites.

Miller's hopes rest on Dave Mann, :10.2 in the 100: 22.5 in the 220, and about 23 feet in the board jump. If Mann can win these three events Miller will be in contention, Les Green and Willie Wright, 53 in the quarter, will run head-on with Tucker and Elzy of N. W. who already have been timed in 52 flat.

Miller's hurdlers, Isaac Groves and Don Berry, will be smong fast company when they lock up with Joe Howard of Northwestern.
