Middlecoff Clips Par To Take Lead In Colonial Golf

Fort Worth, Tex., May 26.—(AP)—A steady, uphill battle with a treacherous par paid off Saturday for Dr. Cary Middlecoff, the Memphis, Tenn., golfer-dentist, as he took the Skidolee lead in the Colonial National invitation tournament with a 208 total.

Middlecoff extracted a one-under par 66 from the rugged, 7,000-yard Colonial layout to snatch the lead away from leader Ben Hogan, the home-born entity whose name collapsed to its worst point in the tournament's history when he took a four-over par 74.

Hogan dropped four strokes off the pace at 213 and found himself in fourth spot behind Middlecoff and two other veteran campaigners, Ronald Ed (Rocky) Oliver and Byron Nelson, the Roanoke, Tex., rancher-farmer.

Patty Berg Takes Cross-Country Lead Over Babe Zaharias

White Plains, N. Y., May 26.—(AP)—Patty Berg, veteran Minneapolis campaigner, shot a five-over-par 75 Saturday to take a one-stroke lead over Mrs. Babe Dilliford Zaharias at the end of 128 holes in the 14-hole Westchester Cross-Country golf tournament.

The steady Miss Berg played consistently although not brilliantly and carded several 39's going out and coming in.

Her 76, which included only one birdie and six boges, coupled with her previous 432-stroke total—announced as the traveling tourney swung through Dallas, Pebble Beach, Calif., and Indianapolis—gave her an aggregate score of 528, one better than Mrs. Zaharias' 529.

Although cheered on by the gallery, Babe could do no better than a 41-37-79 Saturday and admitted she was far off her game.

Battlefield Wins

New York, May 26.—(AP)—Battlefield, the 1890 two-year-old champion, scrambled back into the three-year-old picture Saturday by winning the 76th Withers Mile with a scintillating burst of speed in the stretch at Belmont Park. Jumbo was second, The Phantom Farm's Nulility was third.

Ottaville piled up 45 points to win on a soggy field at Ann Arbor. Cadillac led by the belt. Hans Dale Stevens, scored 25 4/7 points.

Ottawa Hills was paced to its stunning victory by smooth striding Brown, who used all prominent pretensions by securing a double victory in the 100-yard dash and 200-yard sprint, plus the 100-yard spot on the third place half mile relay team for a total of 12 points.

Heavy rains left the Michigan State College track in puddles and hampered any record breaking as did heavy tailwinds during the morning's preliminaries. If it hadn't been for the inclement weather, Brown would have more than likely shattered a record or two.

In the morning's preliminary, he matched the 24-year-old 100-yard dash mark of 9.8 and bettered the 22.0 record by 2/10 of a second. However, both marks were disallowed because of sliding winds.

OTTAWA HILLS came from nowhere to steal away the big school crown. While the crowd was watching the Saginaw school and Ann Arbor, the Grand Rapids entry kept piling up points.

The double was by Brown had the backing of good help by some of his less spectacular teammates.

Coming into the final event, the pole vault, only Ann Arbor had a chance to overturn the change. Saginaw Arthur Hill, a disappointed runner-up, won the vault but still couldn't catch up.

Gerard Wolf, Ann Arbor University High, was the strongman for the Class C winners. Here again it was the dashes that paid off, as Wolf sprinted the field for first in both the 100 and 200.

Another double winner was Tom Wynn, Monroe, who drilled in an amazing time of 19.6 in the 100 yard free hurdle.

BESIDES BROWN'S victories, Ottawa picked up the rest of its points as a second in the bronze-jump, a third in the 800 yard relay, a fourth in the medley relay, a fourth in shot put and a four way tie for fifth in the high jump.

Long-legged Horace Armstrong, Ferndale, was only 2/10 of a second off of a Class A 440 record in winning his heat with ease on a 58.6 clocking.

George Jayne of Ann Arbor glided home in a noteworthy 2:08.8 for the 880-yard triumph in what might have been a record if track conditions had not been so poor.

Battle Creek's sensational Jimmy Arnold had a full 15 yards to spare in closing the mile run in 6:41.3 as Kalamazoo's Jim Bishop finished second.

AT ANN ARBOR, little Ottaville High School, with an enrollment of 123 students, slinked to an easy victory in the state Class D track meet.

Ottaville's eight-man team placed in 10 events and took two firsts to best out defending champion Benton Harbor St. John's, which had 28, Newman Dickson Brothers followed with 26.

Nearly all of the 539 residents of Ottaville came to see the school take its first state championship.

Cadillac scored 25 4/7 points to step way out on the Class B field and depose defending champion Niles.

Mc Pleasant, with 18 1/8 points, was the runner-up to the victorious Cadillac team, followed by Romeo 17, Ludington 17, Battle Creek Lakesview 15 1/2, Niles 15, Roseville and Zeeland 12, and east Grand Rapids 10.

Behind victorious Ottaville came Benton Harbor 21, John St. Newman Dickson Brothers 20, Michigan School for the Deaf 20, New Hudson 17, Spring Arbor 15, and Central Lake 11.

Bob Williams, of Cassville, and Dale Stevens of Cadillac shared instructional honors with Junior Stalstra, Ludington's outstanding trackster and Kay Koffer, Mc Pleasant pole vaulter who set the only meet record.
