

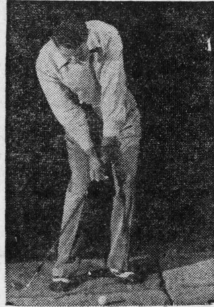
WIN IN B AND D

ANN ARBOR—Track men from Cadillac and Otisville proved the best mudders in their respective classes as 450 high school athletes settled Class B and Class D thinciad championships at Ann Arbor.

Doctoring Your Golf

PATIENTS' COMPLAINT: Poor Elevation in Pitch Shots.
DIAGNOSIS: Not Enough Wrist Action.
TREATMENT: Don't confuse chip and pitch shots. Chip shots are intended to hit the green and run to the hole.

Pitch shots fly much higher and are intended to land near the hole. There is a minimum of wrist action in chip shots but definite wrist action in the pitch.

It's the wrist action that gives you the elevation you need to drop on the green without roll. Keep your hands ahead of the clubhead.

Cadillac, sparked by versatile Dale Stevens, won three events and placed second in three others to roll up a 33 6/7 point total for an easy victory over Mt. Pleasant, which had 18 1/2 points.

Trailing in Class B were Ecorse and Ludington, with 7 each, Battle Creek Lakeview, 13 1/2, and Niles, 13.

Bob Willingham, taking second place in the high hurdles, high jump, and pole vault, and a fourth in the broad jump, paced the classy Otisville delegation which placed in 10 of the 15 events to count 45 points in Class D.

Benton Harbor St. John's pressed with 39. Brethren had 35, and Michigan School for the Deaf 36.

TORRENTIAL RAINS, driven by high wind, marred the afternoon finals, forced field events indoors, and slowed all runners and hurdlers.

Mt. Pleasant's Ray Keffer established the only new record as he took advantage of Yost Fieldhouse footing to win the pole vault with a 12-foot, 2 1/4-inch leap that improved by a slim quarter of an inch the old Class B standard of 12-feet, 2 1/4-inches established in 1941 by East Lansing's Gybert.

Ludington's Junior Stielstra, who, who also won the broad jump and ran third in the high hurdles, equalled his own state Class B mark of 20.6 seconds as he overcame muddy conditions to win the 180-yard low hurdles.

Saturday marked the first time any of the annual state high school track carnival had been held at Ann Arbor. All four classes have been run off at East Lansing in the past but continued growth of the meet dictated the split.
