

Each Captures Two Events But Arthur Hill Takes Crown

Bernard, Schultz Grab Individual Titles; Locals Win Mile, Middle Distance Relays

Mt. Pleasant — Defending champion Flint Northern settled for third place and Flint Central finished fourth here Saturday as the Central Michigan Relays concluded its two-day meet with Class A and Class C championships.

Each Flint school captured two first places but Saginaw Arthur Hill and Saginaw High grabbed three apiece and shared another to take the two top spots. Arthur Hill had 83 3/5 points and Saginaw totalled 78 3/5. Northern scored 57 1/2 points and Central had 47 1/2.

The Class C championship went to Shepherd with 59 points, one more than Charlevoix. Among Flint area schools Vassar was fourth and Durant fifth. Mayville had 8 points, Birch Run and Millington 7 each and Linden 3. Goodrich was blanked.

Four records were broken in the Class A section with Bay City Central getting two new marks. Bob Schermerhorn won the 120-yard high hurdles in :15.3 and its distance medley team was clocked in 11:32.

Saginaw won the shuttle hurdles relay in 1:00.27 and Bob Dust of Arthur Hill soared 11 feet 6 inches in the pole vault for the other records.

The Class A title was decided in the final event, the 880-yard relay which Arthur Hill won. The top two teams went into the last race with 73 3/5 points each. Northern was second and Central finished fourth.

Northern's middle distance relay combine—Earl Bright, Lew Mays, Jim McVicar and Dan Walters—captured one of the Vikings' two victories, touring the mile and a half distance in 6:20.2. Central was fifth in the same event with Duane Davis, Chuck Conner, Cliff Milum and Art Mullens.

Ron Schultz of Northern won the broad jump with a leap of 24 feet 1 1/2 inches and Central's Virgin Windom was second with a leap of 20 feet 5 1/2 inches.

Lacey Bernard of Central heaved the 12-pound shot 51 feet to win his event and the Tribe foursome of Jim Carter, Ken Moore, Chuck Badal and Frazier Self won the mile relay in 3:36.7 to account for their team's first places.

Northern won four seconds, two thirds, a fourth and a fifth. Central had two seconds, two thirds, two fourths and a fifth.

In the 600-yard Central relay, Northern's team of Leon Burton, Frank Neal, R. G. Johnson and Lon Thomas were second while Central was fourth with Ullus Silk, George Peck, Don Kurtz and Jim Popoff.

Northern's Thomas was second in the 100-yard dash by one-tenth of a second and its 880-relay team of Burton, Thomas, Schultz and Neal also was second. Central was fourth in the 880-relay with Carter, Silk, Self and Popoff.

Don Bersinger, Windom, Bill Epps and Don Farrington combined to give the Indians a second in the two-mile relay and Burton, Johnson, Neal and Schultz were second for Northern in the 440-relay.

Peck, Wally Wilcox, Bernard

and George Folsom took a third for Central in the sprint medley relay. Northern won thirds with Elmer Hawkins in the high hurdles and with Werner Strong, Vern Franklin, Schultz and Hawkins in the shuttle hurdles relay. Paul Gratsch was third for Central in the mile run.

Northern's scoring was completed with Strong's fourth in the high jump and its sprint medley relay fifth with Bill Austin, Jim Magill, Mays and Jim Jones.

Churchill Downs Oval Sets Wagering Record

Louisville, Ky. — AP — A record \$3,675,542 was bet on the nine races Saturday at Churchill Downs. The mark topped by \$39,139 the previous high level—\$3,636,403 in 1947.

Wagering on the Kentucky Derby itself totaled \$1,294,474—also a record high. The old mark was \$1,253,042 on the 1947 Derby. A total of \$3,559,382 was bet on all races run on Derby Day last year. Of this, \$1,248,026 was wagered on the Derby.
