# McLuckie Sets New Shot Mark

MT. PLEASANT - Saginaw Arthur Hill raced to a first in Class A 880-yard relay Saturday afternoon to edge past their cross-town rivals, Saginaw High, and win the 11th annual Central Relays ti-Tom McLuckie helped Midland cop ninth place in the Class A meet

by establishing a new Midland High School shot put record. His heave of 47 feet, three and one-half inches earned him a third medai in the event. The Blue Jays of Shepherd High School racked up 59 points to edge Charlevoix by one point for

Class C crown. Ecorse, the only school to successfully defend its title, piled up 56 points for the Class B trophy. Norman-Dickson of Brethren won the Class D laurels by amassing a total of 68 points.

Midland Charles Temple clipped a 4:52.7 minutes mile for a first in that event, the lone first for the Chemics in the meet.

Going into the final event of the day, the halfmile relay, both the Saginaw schools were deadlocked in the scoring department, 73 3-5 all. The Hill anchor man broke the tape a fraction of a second ahead of the Saginaw High final runner for the team meet trophy.

Midland scoring was held to a minimum on two counts: (1) Too many other well balanced teams having "specialty men" and (2) the absence of Tom Ball and Paul Pappas. Ball has been ill with the measles and has just been released from confinement. Pappas on the other

hand has chickenpox and was at home at the time of the meet. McLuckie's record smashing heavy of the shot broke the school record set last year by Lee Hartman. The old record was 46 feet, seven

inches. A fourth in both the sprint medley relay and the middle distance S relay earned four points each for

A grand total of 16 meet records were wiped out during the relays. Four Class A marks went out the window, four in Class B, none in Class C and eight in Class D.

Class C St. Louis ranked seventh in the meet; Breckenridge ninth, McDwen said: "I just wanted hi and Hemlock. 23rd. In class D, Merrill ranked fifth.
