biology and chemistry were especially good.

"There is an attempt to offer some instruction in art on the secondary level as well as attention directed toward vocal and instrumental music.

"There is, also, a diversified shop program . . .

"Physical education classes are offered to both boys and girls."

Then Mr. Leach went on to point out a number of ways in which the school could be improved, stating that vocal music could be offered to both boys and girls, that a farm shop should be provided, that art classes should be extended to include the upper four grades, that the librarian be given more time to supervise the library, that locker room and shower facilities be improved, and that the possibility of starting a school cafeteria be investigated. (Mr. Jensen points

out that most of these suggestions have already been acted on and that plans to work out the others are under consideration.)

In full accord with the present reorganization proposal, Mr. Leach says emphatically, "It is of paramount importance to launch the proposed building program which would result in new elementary buildings leaving the existing building facilities for grades seven through twelve." Then he goes on to say, "Saline High School is at present a good school and deserves high rating. But this fact should not deter you from working full speed ahead on the proposed building program."

And Mr. Jensen echoes the remarks of Mr. Leach with the following statement: "Saline High School cannot even hope to retain its high rating if our classrooms are permitted to become overcrowded, nor can we hope to qualify for accreditation by North Central if we cannot maintain a

pupil-teacher ratio conducive to effective learning. Therefore it is of utmost importance for the welfare of our boys and girls that the proposed reorganization project and building program be approved by the people of this area."
