

Saginaw Again State 'A' Track Titlist; Union Is Fifth

Ann Arbor—(UP)—Saginaw High school held its sixth state class A track championship in eight years Monday but the top individual performer in the annual meet held Saturday at East Lansing and Ann Arbor was Ray Eggleston, East Jackson's great all-around athlete.

Eggleston streaked and leaped to four first places, tying a record set in 1932, as he single-handedly boosted East Jackson into a tie for the class C championship with Ann Arbor University High.

He won the 120-yard high hurdles, the 180-yard low hurdles, the broad jump and the high jump to score all of his team's 24 points.

Roseville, led by Bob Zimmerman, claimed the class B title while little Norman-Dickson of Brethren took top honors in class D.

Rain removed most chances for new state records, but Don Beurle

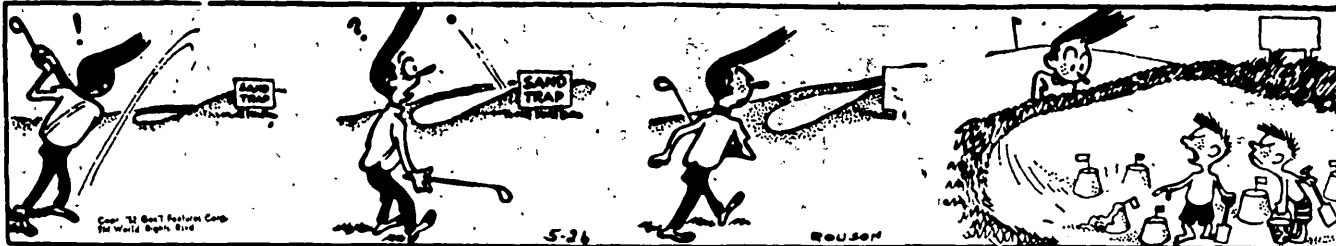
of Suttons Bay managed to eclipse the 100-yard dash record in class D before the steady drizzle started.

Beurle sprinted the 100 in 10.2 seconds in the morning preliminaries to clip one-tenth of a second off the old mark established in 1945. He covered the same distance in a much slower 11.1 seconds to grab the title in the finals.

Saginaw's balance paid off in class A and the Trojans were kings again. They won the title five straight years starting in 1945 before Flint Northern ended their reign two years ago.

Bob Pildner gave Saginaw its only first. The brilliant middle distance runner won the 880-yard run in 2:04.2 minutes.

The Trojans piled up a total of 21 points. Pontiac was second with 19 points, followed by Highland Park, 18½; Kalamazoo, 18; Grand



Rapids Union, 17½, and Grosse Pointe, 17.

Zimmerman was a double winner for Roseville, grabbing the broad jump with a 20-foot 4¼-inch leap and the 220-yard dash in 23.9 seconds. He also ran a leg on Roseville's winning 880-yard relay team.

Roseville piled up 33 points, more than double the 16-point total mustered by runnerup Cadillac. Birm-

ingham, Marshall and Sturgis tied for third with 14 points and Alma and Fenton deadlocked for sixth with 13 points.

Eggleston won the high hurdles in 15.8 seconds, the low hurdles in 31.2 seconds, leaped 21 feet 7½ inches in the broad jump and cleared 5 feet 10 inches in the high jump.

Jerry Wolf and Howard Young

gave Ann Arbor University High firsts in the 220-yard dash and the pole vault, respectively, to enable their school to share with East Jackson the title it won outright in 1951. Whitehall was third with 23 points and Lansing Everett, a pre-meet favorite, fourth with 13½ points.

Brethren made the class D race a runaway with two firsts, a second

and five thirds, helping boost the school's point total to 46 2/5. Dick Deane won the 120-yard high hurdles for Brethren and Teammate Don Stroup took the high jump.

Edwardsburg was second with 10 2/5 points, followed by Detroit University school and Suttons Bay with 15 2/5 points each; Merrill 14 2/5; Michigan School for the Deaf, 13 4/5, and Beal City, 12 2/5.
