Class B, D State Titles To Roseville, Brethern

Ray Vandersteen, Grand Ledge Half- Miler, Wins Class B Race

Two new champions were crowned amid a sea of mud and a pouring rain on the Michigan State college cinder paths late Saturday afternoon, as the annual Michigan high school track and field championships ran its watery course.

Roseville ousted Cadillac from its Class B throne and Brethern pushed aside Otisville in Class D, both winning the titles by more than comfortable margins. Roseville ran up a total of 33 points to second-place Cadillac's 16, while Brethern scored 42 2/5 against Edwardsburg's 20 2/5. Otisville was shoved far down the list, landing 11th with 10 2/5 points.

Following Cadillac in Class B were Sturgis, Marshall and Birmingham with 14 points, Alma and Fenton with 13, Petoskey with 11 and Mt. Pleasant with 10 1/2. Sutton's Bay and Detroit University school were tied for third in Class D, each with 15 2/5 points, followed by Merrill at 14 2/5, School for the Deaf at 13 4/5, Beal City at 12 2/5, New Troy at 11 2/5, Eau Clair and Baldwin at 11 and Otisville.

Slacer Places

The only Greater Lansing entrant to place was Lee Slacer of East Lansing, who finished fourth in his section of the Class B 880 for one point. Area contestants fared a little better, however, as Grand Ledge tied for 14th when Ray Vandersteen won his Class B 880 section for five points and Doyla Root was fifth in the mile, giving the Comets a total of seven points. Howell scored six for 17th place in Class B as Carmen Kypke took second in the pole vault and Lynn Holley was sixth in the mile.

Roseville ran up its winning margin.

Beurle also had the distinction of setting the only record of the day, when he won a preliminary heat of the 100-yard dash in the morning, before the track became too muddy. His time was :10.2, one-tenth of a second faster than the mark of Arlon Dennison of the Michiran School for the Deaf, set in 1945.
