ANN ARBOR, May 24—A record low total of 21 points today brought Saginaw High its sixth state high school Class A track

championship in eight years.

Individually, there was nothing to match the feats of East Jackson's Ray Eggleston. With victories in four events—the high and low hurdles, the broad jump and high jump—Eggleston became the first prep since 1932 to score four triumphs in a single meet.


