E. Jackson Ace Stars

He Triumphs in 4 Events

ANN ARBOR, May 24—A record low total of 21 points today brought Saginaw High its sixth state high school Class A track championship in eight years.

At the same time in rain and mud over the University of Michigan and Michigan State college tracks Roseville triumphed in Class B, East Jackson and University High tied in Class C and Brethren grabbed Class D honors.

Individually, there was nothing to match the feats of East Jackson's Ray Eggleston. With victories in four events—the high and low hurdles, the broad jump and high jump—Eggleston became the first prep since 1932 to score four triumphs in a single meet.

ONE-MAN TEAM

He accounted for all but a half-point of East Jackson's total in emerging as a "one-man" track team.

Competing with an injured heel, bruised in practice Friday, the athletic blond was only one second away from a record in the high hurdles with 15.8 and the same distance away from the low hurdles record with 21.2.

He got off a broad jump of 21 feet 7½ inches and a high jump of 5 feet 10 inches.

Despite the weather conditions one meet record fell, Don Buerle of Suttons Bay turning the trick with a clocking of 10.2 seconds in the Class D 100-yard dash preliminaries.

The old mark was :10.3. Buerle won the finals also, but the heavier track slowed his time to 11.1 seconds.

Saginaw, the meet favorite, finished two points ahead of Pontiac, which in turn led Highland Park by a half-point. Kalamazoo Central followed with 18, Grand Rapids Union 17½ and Grosse Pointe 17. It was the closest meet in 26 years.

ONLY ONE VICTOR

The new champions produced only one individual winner in Half-Miler Bob Pildner. The Trojans placed second and sixth in the high hurdles, a fourth and sixth in the shot-put, a fifth place tie in the pole vault and a third-place tie in the high jump.

Detroit area thinclads in "A" garnered their share of personal glory. Wyandotte's Duane Root won the high hurdles and was just nipped in the low.

Grosse Pointe's Bob Schaller captured a half-mile run section. Alonzo Harris of Pontiac won both dashes, Ray Gray of Grosse Pointe triumphed in the 440-yard run, Fordson won the medley relay and Mt. Clemens the half-mile relay.

HERO FOR ROSEVILLE

Bob Zimmerman was the hero in Roseville's team victory in "B." He won the broad jump and 220-yard dash and ran the anchor leg on the school's winning half-mile relay.

Zimmerman received help from Jack Kerchhoff, who won the 180-yard low hurdles and Norman Morin who took second section of the 880-yard run. Defending champion Cadillac placed second with 16 points, while Birmingham tied Marshall and Sturgis for third, each with 14 points.

BIG DISAPPOINTMENTS

Major disappointments were Mt. Pleasant, the "B" team choice, and Dave Goodell, the school's star shot putter. The latter with a toss of 53 feet 4 inches missed setting a record. In regional competition he had tossed the iron ball 55 feet 9 inches.

Eggleston's performance, of course, stole the show in Class C. Ann Arbor University High was led by Jerry Wolf, who won the 220, and Howard Young, victor in the pole vault.

Brethren, from distant Manistee County, ran away with the "D" proceedings, scoring 46 2-5 points to second place Edwardsburg's 20 2-5. Detroit University School tied Suttons Bay for third, each with 15 2-5 points.

Team honors in the Upper Peninsula meet at Houghton went to Sault Ste. Marie (Class B), Wakefield (C) and Pickford (D).

McEwen Beaten

EVANSTON, Ill., May 24 (AP)—Don McEwen, of Michigan, champion two miler of the Western Conference, today was defeated for the first time in his collegiate career.

Rich Ferguson, Iowa freshman, conquered McEwen in the two mile event, beating him in a stirring stretch burst by six yards. McEwen, off in front, set the pace until Ferguson moved up from last place.

The event was run under rain-soaked conditions in a triangular meet in which Michigan piled up 85½ points to 62½ for Iowa and 13 for Northwestern.

The Wolverines swept the field events, winning the first three places in the high jump, first and second in the shot, and first in the discus, broad jump and pole vault.

Golf Title To Shrine

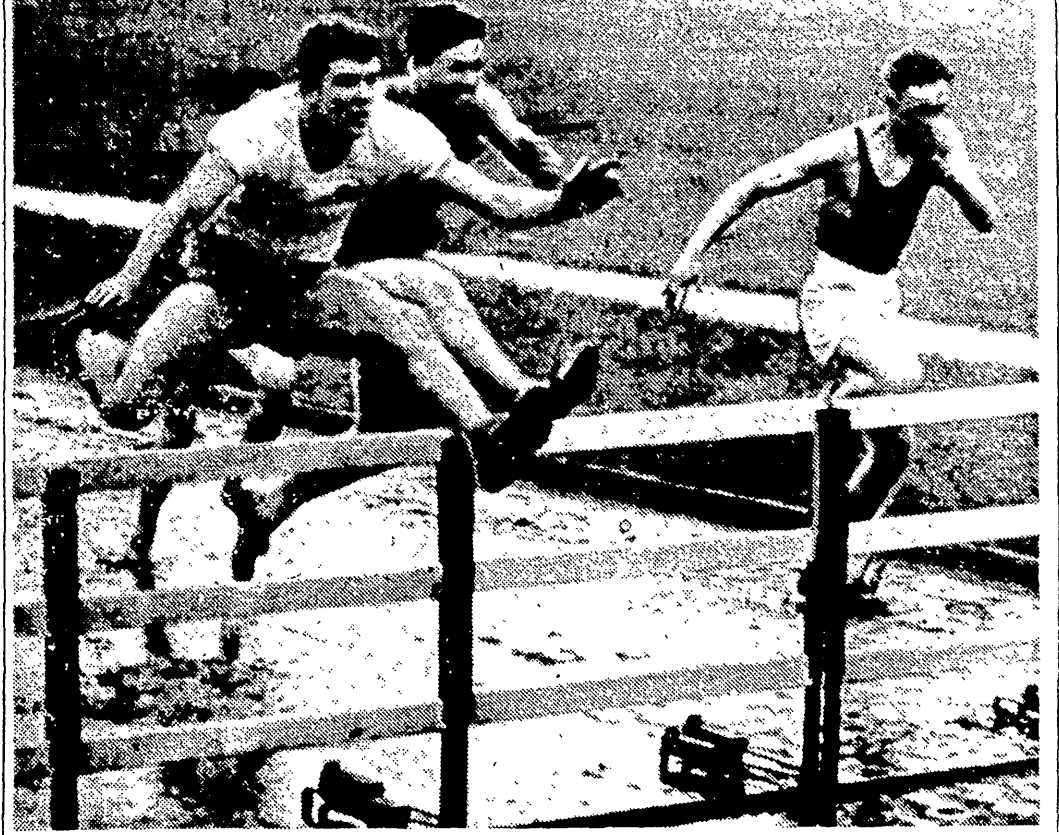

Charles (Chuck) Kocsis is back at his old place of business on the District Golf Association's Honor Roll—at the top of the heap.

The Red Runner, as a member of the handicap committee with Judge Neal Fitzgerald, chairman, and John W. Foley Jr., "yanked" himself off the list a year ago because he figured he hadn't played enough tournament golf the previous season to justify his selection.

But this time it's different, as even he had to admit to the others on the committee. His record for 1951 not only "demanded" his inclusion but automatically established him as the No. 1 man. Here's what he did:

STARRED IN OPEN

Was low amateur and tied for sixteenth in the overall standings in the National Open at Oakland Hills.

Won the Michigan Amateur for the sixth time.

Tied for third in the Michigan Open at Western, and—

Was co-champion in the Red Run Invitational.
Early as it is, it nevertheless can be pointed out that Kocsis is off to a running start for the same place on the list of 10 to be selected a year hence. He was low amateur in the last Masters, always a notable performance.

Honor Roll selections are based on tournament showings. That's why although the district handicap list, also announced Saturday, has five golfers with scratch ratings, only two of them—Jim Funston of Plum Hollow as well as Kocsis—are named.

BEN SMITH UP THERE

Ben Smith of Lochmoor placed by winning the district championship and reaching the semifinals of the Michigan Amateur. He also was co-champion in the Birmingham Invitational.

Next comes Lloyd Martz of Red Run, medalist in the local trials for both the National Open and Amateur. He reached the fourth round in the Amateur, and was runnerup in the District Amateur, as well as second with Jimmy Johnson in the Michigan Pro-amateur.
