Record Set In One of 4 Victories

Redford Miller Speeds to Another

A crack relay unit from Miller High and a strong-kicking miler—Ken Santer, of Redford — blazed to record performances Tuesday in the 19th running of the Wayne University Relays.

An earlier winner, the speedy Trojan combination of Rex McLeod, John Massingale, Godfrey Little and Don Thomas doubled in the half-mile midway through the six-hour session to produce a blistering 1:30.2.

THEY SHAVED three-tenths of a second off the record seemingly out of reach by Northern a year ago. The time ranks almost a full second better than Northern's present City League record.

Miller's double sprint triumph—the same unit also won the 440—accounted for half the East Siders' conquests and enabled the Trojans to pile up a mythical tally of 23 points, more than double all others.

Along with the McLeod-Massingale-Little-Thomas quartet, Redford's four-mile relay unit was the only record-breaker. Some 700 athletes represented 37 schools in the competition on Sawyer Field.

THE REDFORD mark goes down as 18:56.5 to the credit of Richard Early, Bill Spaller and Dick and Ken Santer. But it was Ken Santer and Fordson's Gerald Zitny who really cracked the mark.

They lacked in a stirring anchor mile leg, and though Zitny reeled off one of the fastest miles the Relays ever have produced, he could not overhaul the durable Huskie.

Santer had taken off on his leg with a 30-yard lead on Zitny. The Fordson ace, who earlier this season had unofficially bet to win, 14 to 6.

Southfield Nine Wins 9th Straight, Title

Southfield High, the ambitious suburban athletic upstart, captured its second Inter-Lakes Conference title in a week Tuesday.

The 11th-grade school on Lassar Road over 10 Mile won its ninth straight baseball game, defeating Keweenaw, 3 to 2, behind the effective three-hitting of Tom McCormach.

The triumph clinched the conference title. Only a week ago Southfield won the Inter-Lakes golf crown.

McCORMACH, WHO has pitched all nine victories, added 11 more strikeouts to his spring total. He has now struck out 122 batters in 79 innings.

Jim Simmons singled home both the tying and winning runs in the seventh inning.

Fordson's Bob Simon beat out Moore's Ken McBoe, 3 to 1, in a 14th-inning pitcher's duel. Fordson was in the 14th on Don Spawman's third hit of the game, a single which scored Bob Simon.

Both hurlers went the route, Simon giving up five hits and McBoe six. The triumph kept Fordson at the top of the Border Cities Conference standings.

St. Mary of Redford tied St. Thomas for the Catholic League West Side baseball lead with a two-run seventh inning against which netted a 2-1 victory.
