

For Want of a Track Shoe, Title Was Lost (by Redford)

Once upon a time, so the story goes, the loss of a horseshoe swung the tide of a battle. The same thing happened in the Metropolitan League's West Side track meet yesterday. A boy lost a shoe in a race and Redford lost the team title to Northwestern, 78½ to 73½. The accident happened shortly

after the start of the mile run. Fifteen-year Dick Santer, Redford pacesetter in other races this season, was spiked slightly and lost a shoe on the first turn. Dick was 20 seconds back when he started chasing the field and failed to place. He had been figured to finish in the first four. Dick's older brother, Ken, was the winner, and two teammates,

Dick Ehrle and Dick Spaller, were fourth and fifth, giving Redford nine points. "We might have had 14 or 15 with young Santer setting the pace for us," Coach Ben Silverberg said. Fred Bradley, recent arrival from Cameron, Tex., and Maxie Harris were Northwestern's top athletes. Fred had 15 on firsts in the broad jump and high jump plus a tie for second in the pole vault. Harris scored 13, winning the 100 and 220 and anchoring Northwestern's third place sprint relay.

IN COLONIAL MEET

Bolt Discovers Scoring Error, Gives Up \$275

FORT WORTH, Tex., May 29.—(AP)—Officials of the Colonial Invitation golf tournament today redistributed \$275 in prize money returned by Tommy Bolt, who voluntarily disqualified himself from a 19th place tie because of a scoring error. Bolt's action changed the results of the last six money-winning places in last week's \$25,000 tournament, providing prizes for three additional golfers and increasing the awards won by five others. Bolt explained that he learned from newspaper accounts after last week's \$25,000 tournament had ended that he had been credited with a six-over-par 76 for his final round, but that he actually shot a 77.

Ward Takes Quarterfinal

HOYLAKE, England, May 29.—Harvie Ward, only American left in the British Amateur golf tournament, joined England's Arthur Perowne and Ireland's Joe Carr and Cecil Beamish in the semifinals today. Ward, the defending champion, blasted out C. W. Windrow, of England, 5 and 4, in his quarterfinal. Perowne, his opponent this afternoon, beat J. W. Draper, of Scotland, 4 and 3. Beamish ousted Dixon Rawlinson, of England, 4 and 3; and Carr defeated Scotsman Joe Lambie, 1 up. Ward won seven of the first 10 holes and Windrow halved the other three only with fine recovery shots. Ward shot a 38 on the front nine, two over par, and was even par for the five holes needed on the back. Carr, whom he is expected to face in tomorrow's final, shot 40-37-77. Carr is in the semifinals for the third straight year.

First Driver Wins 2 Hard-Top Races

Ronnie Duman last night became the first two-time hard-top winner at Motor City Speedway this season. He took the feature in 6:41.79 before a crowd of 2,706. The race was halted at the end of 23 laps when Bob Sampson and George Cooper hit a wall and bounced into the center of the track. No one was injured. Jack Goodwin, Leon Blachura, Wild Bill Nalda and Bill Flannery followed Duman across. The drivers return tomorrow for 140 laps of racing, including a 50-lap feature.

Americans Pack French Net Finals

PARIS, May 29.—(AP)—Maureen Connolly and Julie Sampson reached the women's doubles finals today in the French International Tennis Championships. Earlier, Miss Connolly, Doris Hart and Vic Seixas all qualified for the singles finals. The American doubles team beat Italy's Sylvania Lazzarino and Nicole Migliori, 6-1, 6-2. Seixas upset Egypt's Jaroslav Drobný, 6-2, 6-2, 3-6, 6-3, yesterday. Miss Connolly beat Dorothy Head Knode, 6-3, 6-3, and Miss Hart beat Shirley Fry, 8-6, 6-4. Seixas teams with Gardner Mulloy in a doubles semifinal, and Miss Hart and Miss Fry team together in another.

Wedding Keeps Al Out of Open, but Not Trial

Al Watrous is listed among the 57 pros who will vie with 49 amateurs in the U. S. Open trials at Knollwood and Orchard Lake Monday. But Al isn't going to Pittsburgh even if he qualifies. Another family crisis has developed for Watrous. Once he passed up an Open championship to attend the graduation of Pat, his eldest daughter. This time it is something of even greater importance. His youngest daughter, Gloria, is to be married June 13. That's the day the final 36 holes of the Open will be played at Oakmont. So Al will be here with Gloria. But Al will compete in the trials Monday to see how he stacks up with the other 106 entrants. The low 16 scorers qualify for the Open. That's because the field has been increased to 300 and a 36-hole qualifying round scheduled at Pittsburgh over Oakmont and nearby Pittsburgh Field Club. The 150 low scorers there go into the 72-hole Open at Oakmont. Chick Harbert, Walter Burkemo and Dick Whiting, district amateur champion, head the players in the trials.
