

WAYNE RELAYS DOMINATION HONORED

Cooley Gains More Glory Standing Still

Sparkling performances came out of the City League Monday, but the only champion crowned was Cooley High, which had not a single athlete in action.

In a busy day of track and baseball, Coach Claude Snarey and his idle Cardinals were honored for past performances in the Wayne Relays.

Rival coaches granted them permanent possession of the Class A team trophy. Cooley had won it nine of the last 14 years. No team winner will be determined in the 19th Relays, set for May 19, and the cup is being retired.

A record field of 33 teams were entered in the giant Carnival at a heat-drawing meeting Monday night.

ON THE playfields, Redford's defending West Side baseball champions launched their season belatedly with a 5-0 triumph over Central, the result of masterful two-hit pitching by George Clawson.

Clawson struck out 12 and yielded only a double to Jack Cawthop and a triple to George Milkowski. Gerry Rensberger collected three hits for the Huskies.

An eighth-inning single by Jerry Gordon scored Nick Backos with the winning run as Mackenzie nipped Southwestern, 5 to 4. Pershing's Bob Milo, a speedy southpaw, fanned 13 and allowed only six hits while dumping Pershing, 5 to 2. Little Earl Perry homered for the losers in the first inning.

Northwestern routed Chadsey, 13 to 8, behind the five-hit hurling of Henry Smith.

IN TRACK, three top spring performances were produced. Northeastern's durable Willie Adkins, who a week ago won four events in a single meet, repeated his quadruple triumph and registered the season's fastest time for the high hurdles.

Busy Willie skipped the event in :15.2. He also won the lows in :13.7, the pole vault at 10 feet and the broad jump at 21-2½.

Adkins' victories, however, failed to save Northeastern from a 63-45 loss to Northern, which grabbed six firsts and eight seconds, including slams in the 220 and shot put. Northern got a :22.3 victory from Eugene Moore in the 220, the best of the spring.

Redford's Ken Santer stepped off the fastest mile, 4:39, as the Huskies routed Mumford, 82 to 22. John Compton won the sprints in :10.7 and :22.8, Mary Carlisle the hurdles in :16 and :14.5 and Dick Anderson the high jump and pole vault at 5-8 and 10-6 to lead Redford.

Northwestern spanked Mackenzie, 72½ to 36½, with Max Harris taking the sprints in :10.3 and :22.8 for the Colts.
