

## Riddled Colts Bow To Redford

Miller's McLeod  
Has Leap of 22' 5"

A rare defeat for title-laden Northwestern, High and a brilliant 22-foot, five-inch broad jump shot the City League's outdoor track and field season to an early peak Thursday.

Redford, the new power of the West Side, handed Northwestern its first dual meet loss in eight years as it outstepped the Colts, 62½ to 48½, on a slow Sawyer Field layout.

The broad jump performance came from Miller's Bob McLeod in an 89½-23½ rout of Denby. McLeod's leap was the best of the season and one of the 22-foot efforts in the league in recent years.

McLeod, a husky senior, also took the high jump, a second in the 220 and ran a winning 880 relay leg.

NORTHWESTERN'S loss of four individual City champions including Miller, Burle Huggins, in recent weeks, doomed the chances of protecting a 60-odd meet winning streak in the Redford showdown.

Nonetheless, the Colts developed the meet's star in Fred Maxie Harris, who slipped the 220 in excellent time of 22.4 and doubled with a :10.5 victory in the century.

Redford, claiming its fourth straight victory, grabbed eight events. Best among them was a field double by Dick Anderson, taking the pole vault at 16.4 and the broad jump at 19-7½, and the 880 relay unit, winning in fast time of 1:54.5.

Northeastern's Willie Adkins, a quadruple winner in his last two meets, finally was beaten, but the strong junior still piled up 18 points as the Falcons whipped Case Tech, 61 to 48.

ADKINS was second to Case Gene Printup in a 16.6 high hurdle run. But he won the pole vault at 10 feet, the low hurdle at 14.2 and the broad jump at 20-3½ for a triple.

Eastern's Fred Hoggood, who broad jumped 22-3½ earlier this season, reached 19-2 to win the event in a triple which included victories in the 100 and 220 as the Indians trampled U-D High, 71 to 20.

Pershing's Jay McKenzie stepped the half-mile in 2:07.4 as the Doughboys trimmed Northern, 41½ to 48½.

Naim Miller swept the sprints in 10.8 and 23.7 as Melozzine raked Chadsey, 77½ to 51½.

Southwestern's Arnold Punderburg won the sprints, broad jump and ran a relay leg as the Prospectors whipped Mumford, 59½ to 48½.
