

No Worries for Rivals; Miller Too Far Ahead

Coach Jimmy Russell of Northwestern made an odd prediction last week after his track team beat Redford by five points for the Metropolitan League West Side crown.

"You won't have to worry about us in the city meet," he said, "Miller will score more points than Northwestern and Redford put together. They're just too good for us."

The remarks were taken lightly by other coaches who recalled occasions when Russell talked the same way but came up with a winner.

This time it was different. The league semi-finals at Denby yesterday saw Miller qualify 14 individuals and two relay teams, Northwestern placing eight and two relays as Redford placed six boys and a relay in Thursday's finals.

NORTHERN MOVES UP

Northern moved up into a contending position with two relays and nine in the individual tests.

Eliminations were held in all events except the mile in which Redford has three, Miller and Northwestern one each.

Including the mile, Miller has 15 finalists, Northwestern, Northern and Redford nine each, with the others well scattered. Southeastern has six individuals; Pershing and Northeastern each five and a relay; Cooley and Eastern three and a relay; Cass and Western, three; Central, two; Southwestern, Mumford and Denby, one; Mackenzie a relay.

Miller, the 1952 team champion, missed out only in the pole vault. Jesse Underwood, the team's best jumper, had been ruled ineligible for playing sandlot ball. Northwestern was unplaced in four events, Northern in five and Redford in six.

HURDLE MARK TIED

Lloyd Swanson of Miller tied the low hurdle record of 13 seconds, set by Willis Ward of Northwestern in 1931 and equalled two years ago by Joe Howard, Northwestern.

The broad jump developed into the hottest competition

in the meet's history. Using a new, wider takeoff board, five boys leaped 22 feet or better, Godfrey Little of Miller clearing 22 feet 9 1/4, against the record of 22 feet 11 1/2 by Cliff Robinson of Northwestern in 1924. Rex McLeod of Miller was an inch behind his teammate.

An ankle injury suffered last week prevented Fred Bradley of Northwestern from qualifying in the broad and high jumps. He made the grade, however, in the pole vault.

Final competition in the field events starts at 2 p.m. tomorrow, with the first race at 3.

Lost Bread, or French toast, is an old Creole dish which may be prepared easily in camp. Beat two eggs and a cup of rich milk together for formation of a custard, and add a tablespoon of sugar if desired. Dip four or five slices of day-old bread in mixture and fry in hot butter, browning on both sides. Toast may be sprinkled lightly with cinnamon and served with bacon or chicken livers on the side.

Bisons Lose Their Extra-Inning Game

Ray Shore, the former St. Louis Brown, provided key relief pitching again last night as the Toronto Maple Leafs beat the Buffalo Bisons, 5-2 and 2-1, to move to within one percentage point of second-place Rochester in the International League.

Shore, who has relieved in 13 of Toronto's 40 games, took over in the tenth inning of the first game and shut out the Tiger farm until the Leafs pushed over the winning run in the last of the 12th. Southpaw Carlton Post hurled a seven-hitter to outpitch Johnny Weiss and give the Leafs a sweep with their victory in the nightcap. Outfielder Frank Campos, on option from Washington, hit a homer in each game for the Leafs.

In other games last night Rochester defeated Montreal, 2-1, then lost the nightcap, 4-2; Syracuse downed Ottawa, 9-5, after bowing in the first game, 3-1, and Baltimore whipped Springfield, 5-0.

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
