Deckerville's Fred Garza, short on size but long on speed, ledgered two of them with a 10.1 clocking in the 100-yard dash and a 20-feet-7 leap in the broad jump to crase marks by Orin Englehardt of Sebewaing and Don Guenther of Unionville, who made 10.4 and 20-feet-6 in 1954 and 1952 respectively.

Garza also added a leg on the winning 880-yard relay team and earned a second to the same Englehardt in the 220-yard dash to edge teammate Bob Kirkpatrick for individual honors.

The other record-breaking performances were turned in by Kirkpatrick, who lowered the 120-yard high hurdles mark to 15.8, bettering a 16.0 effort by Unionville's Jim Ewald in 1951, and then came back later to crack the 180yard high hurdle mark of 22.0 with a 22.1 time. Ewald also held that record.

Sebewaing displayed tremendous depth in the dashes, placing three in the 100-yard event and three in the 220-yard event. However, Sebewaing was nipped by Deckerville in the 880-yard relay by a fraction of a second as the two ran in different heats.

The finest race of the night session, which followed field event finals of the afternoon. came in the 880-yard run. where Unionville was expected to place high but not expected to win.

Doug Nivon and Ed Zimmer. after trailing until the final 100 yards, "kicked out" to Tom VanConnet and George overtake Don Pluto of Schewaing and Dale Swoffer of Deckerville and race for the finish line stride for stride. with Nixon finally edging to the front.

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
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
