

**TRACKMEN WIN, ANYWAY**

**Miller Ace Hurt,  
Misses Records**

Jerry Green slumped on the ground and wept after limping home sixth and last in the 100-yard dash of the Metropolitan League track meet yesterday. A pulled hip muscle had ruined the Miller High star's hopes for four first place ribbons.

Green performed brilliantly in Tuesday's trials, when he set

a record of 21.7 in the 220, ran the 100 in 10 seconds flat, broad jumped 22 feet 6¼ inches and helped establish another mark in the sprint relay.

"He hurt himself in the relay Tuesday and the injury didn't respond to treatment," coach Leroy Dues said. "Jerry wanted to run in the 100 but I scratched him from the 220 and relay."

**ONE VICTORY, ANYWAY**

The 17-year-old senior won first place in the broad jump on his performance Tuesday.

Green's loss made the meet closer than expected though not enough to bother Miller. Winning four events, tying in another and placing second in three Miller had 59 points to 37 for Denby and 32 for Pershing, the defending champion.

Other scores: Central 22, Cody 20½, Northwestern 18, Redford 16, Mackenzie 12½, Cass 11½, Northeastern 10½, Cooley 10, Northern 9, Western 4, Mumford and Southwestern 3, Chadsey 2, Eastern and Southeastern 1.

Bill Stephens, of Central, was the only double winner, placing first in the 100 and 220. "That was a bad break for Jerry," the Central youth said. "I wish he could have run. I might have given him a good race."

The half-mile produced the day's most spectacular duel as Art DeMombrem, of Cass, in the last 10 yards.

One record was broken in the finals. Northern's team of Clarence Willis, Joe Collins, Roosevelt Wilson and Dave Benson ran the medley relay in 2:28.8. The old mark of 2:29.9, made in 1953, also was set by Northern.

Three marks were set in the trials and will be in future record books. These were Green's 21.8 in the 220, Miller's 1:30.5 sprint relay and the 53-foot 10½-inch shot put by Ermin Crownley, of Miller.

The team title was Miller's fifth and the third in four years.
