Bearcat Wins Century Jones Paces Pontiac To Central Relays Win

MOUNT PLEASANT—Pon-tiac, with Hayes Jones winning three events and setting a record in one, won its second consecutive Class A championship in the Central Michigan College High School Relays Saturday.

Reed City repeated as Class C champion on a rain-drenched track in near-freezing temperatures.

Jones Sets One Mark

Inkster won the Class B Title and Pickford the Class D crown Friday.

Jones set a meet record in winning the 120-yard hurdles in 14.9 seconds. The old record was 15.15, set by Bill Chesney of Saginaw in 1955.

Jones also won the 120-yard low hurdles and the broad jump while Perry Williams captured the mile race for Pontiac whose team also won the middle distance, sprint medley and 800-yard relays and came up with three third place finishes.

Reed City's Don Miller won the

Class C 120-yard high hurdles and 180-yard low hurdles and his team took the shuttle-hurdles, sprint medley and middle distance relays.

Pontiac ran up 70 points to 55½ for second-place Lansing Sexton in the A competition.

Trailing the winner and runner up were: Flint Northern, 46; Saginaw Arthur Hill, 35½; Lansing Eastern, 34½; Birmingham, 3; Bay City Central, 16½; Battle Creek Central, 15; Muskegon Heights, 13; Saginaw, 12½; Detroit St. Joseph, 9; Detroit Catholic Central, 8; Waterford Township, 6½; Midland, 6; Flint Central, 4; Traverse City, 3 and Reedford Union, 2.

Central Gets 1st, 2nd

Battle Creek's 13-man squad earned its points in 3 events with sprinter Bob Jones showing the way by taking the 100-yard dash in the slow time of .107 over the sloppy track.

The Bearcats won a 2nd in the Central Michigan 2-mile relay when Doug Roderick, Max Rust, R. D. Warren and Harold Stancle combined their 880 runs for a time of 6:53.6. The other points came when Earl Seamans got a 4th in the mile with a 4:57.9 timing.

Reed City rolled up 53½ points in capturing the C competition, Lansing Everett was second with 40½. Trailing them were:

New Pole Vault Mark

Ithaca, 29½; Berrien Springs, 22½; Flint Dye, 20; Fowlerville, 15; Okemos, 13; Grosse Ile, 16; Flint Atherton, 11½; Marquette, Hart, Hemlock and Leelanau, 10 each; Lake Odessa, 9; Swartz Creek and Beekerville, 7; Hudsonville, 6½; Shelby and North Branch, 6; Marine City, Breckenridge, Capac, Charlevoix and Flint Bentley, 5; Brown City, 4½; Grayling, 4½; Williamston, Whitehall and Scottville, 4; South Lyon and Mt. Dean Look of Lansing Everett pole vaulted 12 feet 3 inches in the rain, breaking the old Class B record of 11.7 set in 1942 by Don DeCow of Marine City.

Casey Clark of Berrien Springs set a record in the high jump with a leap of 5 feet 11½ inches after that event was moved indoors because of slippery takeoff conditions outside. The old mark of 5-10½ was set in 1954 by Jim Vollmer of A. E. Smith, Wyandotte.

Clark didn't miss on any jump until the bar was moved to 6-1. Tom Hummiller of Brown City tied the 100-yard dash mark with a time of .10.3 in the preliminaries, but finished second in the finals.
