Jones, Pontiac Go To Town in Track

Chiefs' Star Sets 2 Records; Lansing Everett Tops Class C

ANN ARBOR — Hayes Jones made all those fabled track performances of his official here Saturday at Ferry Field.

The 160-pound Pontiac High senior set two of the six records established, won three firsts and led the Chiefs to their second straight Class A track and field championship.

Pontiac rolled to a record 61 points by winning six events and scoring in 10 of the 13 on the program, but it was the exciting Jones who really earned the plaudits.

AS THE ONLY triple winner of the day, Jones set a record of 23 feet, 8 7/8 inches in the broad jump, turned in a mark of 14.4 in the high hurdles, won the lows in 19.4 and anchored the winning Pontiac 880-yard relay team for a personal contribution of 19 1/2 points.

Flint Northern outdistanced a half dozen other contenders for second place, scoring 26 points. Birmingham placed third with 23; Lansing Sexton 20 1/2 and Kalamazoo 18.

Lansing Everett breezed to its second Class C title in three years with 45 points and was led by its two-man combination of Dean Look and Roger Quinn. The pair accounted for 33 points.

Reed City, the dethroned champion, was second with 23 points

FINED \$15,000 PLUS


UCLA Handed 3-Year Probation

VICTORIA, B. C. — (AP) — The University of California at Los Angeles was placed on probation for three years Saturday by the Pacific Coast Conference and "fined" approximately \$95,000.

A direct fine of \$15,000 was given UCLA for refusing to give the conference commissioner "the opportunity to conduct an investigation of financial aid given to athletes."

The rest of the assessment is the estimated \$78,000 or more the university will lose in Rose Bowl receipts during its probationary period.

followed by Finstwell with 15, present Linton, St. Clair, Mich. 1954, and Philford 16.

In addition to Jones' triple and Pontiac's victory in the sprint there other Pontiac trials were won by Hudson Ray in the high jump, with a leap of 6 feet, 7 1/2 inches and Bill Douglas, who captured his portion of the half mile.

LEWIS MARKER is a record in the Class C pole vault with a leap of 12 feet 6 inches. Hubert, of Robinson, set a 1947 record in the half mile.

Casey Clark of Horton Springs, Mich. jumped six feet, 1 1/2 inches for another Class C record, while Covert's morning work had accounted for the sixth and final mark of the day.

Tough back performer of the day was Alphonse Peter, Detroit, who turned in record efforts in both distance only to have both marks disallowed.

Four was clocked in 8.7 in the 60 and 21.3 in the 220, but was second both times, by a slight margin. For the first time, 475 miles per hour allowed in record attempt.

Inkster Wins Title In Class B

EAST LANSING—(P)—Class B champion Inkster and surprise Class C winner Covert won trophies to rival tape to with last State high school track championship here Sunday.

Inkster, which carried off its third consecutive crown, set a new record in winning the 880-yard dash, the event. The 11.8 time eclipsed the former championship time of 11.4 by Inkster's predecessor in 1954.

The distance victory gave Inkster the championship with 25 points over St. Louis runner-up with 22.

COVERT A SERIAL champion of both State titles, sent a track team to the State finals for the first time.

Covert also had to win the 800-yard dash, which he did in 1:14.4, a strategy on the Class D title for the last four years.

Covert won with 28 1/2 points, and Jefferson was second with 21. Downside and Westwood had the third with 16, and Newage was 22nd with 11 1/2.

River Rouge was third in the Class B competition with 23 points. It took fourth with 23 and Mount Pleasant fifth with 19 1/2.

The most amusing athlete at the East Lansing end of the high school track meet was Albin Grodzewski of Schoolcraft, high-point man in Class D with 18.

GRINBERG, who was carrying a broken right arm in a cast, hurled from the jump pit to the dash track despite his handicap. He won the event with a lead of 21 feet 4 and 7/8 inches—a Class D record.

Grodzewski also placed second in the 100-yard dash and third in the 220-yard dash.

Ken Roane, one of a pair of competing runners from Southview, contributed 12 points to his school's cause by winning both the 220 and 100-yard dashes.

High point man in Class B was John Palmer, of St. Louis, Mich. with 37 points, including a first in the 100-yard dash, a second in the 200-yard dash, a third in the 400-yard dash and a fifth in the high hurdles.
