Keep Title

Inkster Wins State Crown Third Time

East Lansing — (UP) — Inkster, which won for the third straight year, and Covert, which had a track team for the first time this year, Monday reigned as class B and class D track champions.

But both had to win the final event — the 880-yard relay — to take home their trophies. Inkster's performance in this event will leave track fans talking for a long time. The quartet of Calloway, Bond, Wyatt and Kyser sped to a new state high school standard of 1:31.0, wiping out the class B mark of 1:34.1 set by Inkster last year.

Covert Tops Brethren.

Inkster's 33 points topped by one the total of second-place St. Louis. Other top scorers in the class B meet were River Rouge, 28; Utica, 25, and Mt. Pleasant, 16 1/6.

Covert's 28 1/2 topped Brethren's 25. Brethren had won four consecutive class D titles and was heading for the fifth until Covert took the half-mile relay and Brethren finished third in this event. Third in the point standings were Schoolcraft and Dansville, both with 16, and fifth was Newyago with 14 1/2.

Class B records were set by John Palmer of St. Louis, with a 20 seconds flat performance in the 180-yard low hurdles, the Inkster half-mile relay team, with 2:31.9, and the relay team, with 2:31.9, to erase Adrian's 1953 mark of 2:33.

New Records Go.

Charles Kyser of Inkster took both the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

New class D records were set by Bob Booker of Baldwin with 51.7 seconds in the 440-yard dash, and Al Grisberg, Schoolcraft, with 21 feet 1 1/2 inches in the broad jump.

Roland Jones of Wolverine took both 120-yard high and 180-yard low hurdles in class D. Kenneth Beane won the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

Albion Again Wins MIAA Track Title

Kalamazoo — (UP) — With Dick Cooley winning in both the half-mile and mile events, Albion swept to its third straight MIAA track and field championship over the week-end.

Albion posted 92 1/7 points in the meet at Kalamazoo college. The winners' point total was nearly double that of runnerup Hope which amassed 43 9/14. Hillsdale was third with 34 13/14. Then came Kalamazoo with 21; Calvin, 13 1/7; Alma 13; Olivet 8. Adrian failed to score.

Albion also clinched the all-sports trophy.

Only six Calvin men managed to place. Wayne Gritter tied for first in the high jump, Mel Venema took a fifth in the javelin, Al Vander Grind won third place in the discus and Bob Korhunen took fifth place in the 440-yard dash.

Freshman Jerry Holwerda broke Calvin's school record for the 220 low hurdles when he won the time trials with a :25.2.

Visions OK On Bowl Pact

Grand Rapids, Minn. — (UP) — An end to one controversy and the likely start of another shaped up Monday as the Big Ten opened a week of high-level meetings in Minnesota.

The conference appeared certain to approve an indefinite Rose bowl contract with the Pacific Coast conference, an arrangement which once met with hot objections by certain Big Ten members.

The agenda also includes action on a proposed round-robin Big Ten football schedule, a plan requiring each school to play all others in a nine-game conference slate interrupted by only one non-conference game.

tenth of a second faster than it had ever been run before. And his 21.2 clocking in the 220 was a full half-second below the existing record.

Jones was more fortunate. The wind died down at the start of the 120-yard high hurdles and he was able to clip a tenth of a second off his old record of 14.5 which he set last year.

The wind couldn't have impeded his other record-breaking performance for it came in the broad

jump with a leap of 23 feet, 8 1/2 inches. In fact, Jones managed four leaps which bettered the old record of 22 feet, 11 1/2 inches set by Lansing Central's Theodore Tycocki in 1936.

Jones, who plans to enroll at Michigan Normal next fall, completed his greatest day by winning the 180-yard low hurdles and helping the relay team to victory for an individual total of 19 1/2 points.

Lansing Everett got crack per-

formances from two members of its team, Roger Quinn and Dean Look, to dethrone Reed City as class C champion.

Quinn piled up 17 1/2 points with victory in the broad jump, seconds in both hurdles and a leg on the winning 880-yard relay team while Look scored 15 1/2 points with victory in the pole vault, a second in the 100-yard dash, a fourth in the low hurdles and a leg on the 880-yard relay team.

Thus, Quinn and Look accounted for 33 of their team's 45 points. Reed City was runnerup with 23 points followed by Plainwell with 15, Ypsilanti Lincoln with 14 and Comstock Park with 10 1/2.

The big man for Reed City for the second straight year was Don Miller who successfully defended his titles in both the high and low hurdles.

A total of six records fell during the meet. In addition to the two by Jones, Look set a new mark in the pole vault with a leap of 12 feet, 6 inches; Bob Lake of Kalamazoo Central ran the half-mile in a record 1:58.9; Berrien Springs' Casey Clark set a class C high jump record with a 6-foot, 2-inch effort, and Lansing Everett's three-quarter mile medley relay team turned in a record 2:35.3.

Steve Rhoades, Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills' great miler unbeaten the last three years in dual competition, turned in the best class A mile with a time of 4:33.6. This was his best time ever. Only two boys ever ran a faster mile in Grand Rapids, Joe Host, formerly of Catholic Central, and Don Hoebeke, formerly of Central High, had faster miles.

hers whipped Michigan at Minneapolis, 7 to 6 and 6 to 5, although the Wolverines managed to hang on until the tenth inning in the second.

Michigan State, despite three-run homers in each, lost to Iowa, 5 to 3 and 8 to 3, and skidded to seventh place.

Ohio State fell before Purdue, 5 to 1 and 9 to 5. Indiana beat Illinois, 13 to 2 and 4 to 3, and Northwestern beat Wisconsin, 5 to 2 but dropped the second, 4 to 3, in other Big Ten action.

Chicagoan Holds Lead as ABC Ends

Rochester, N. Y. — (UP) — Bill Lillard, a 28-year-old from Chicago, is the first man in history to win three titles at one American Bowling congress tournament.

The fifty-third annual tournament ended Sunday after 79 days. Lillard led the Falstaff team of Chicago to victory in the team event; paired with teammate Stan Gifford for the doubles title, and with a total of 2,018 took first place for all-events honors.

Lillard not only captured three titles, but pocketed more prize money from a single ABC tournament than ever before.

His winnings came to \$2,180.75 topping the \$2,068.33 won last year in Fort Wayne, Ind., by Fred Back of Detroit.
