


The largest crowd ever to witness a track and field event in

Kalamazoo sports history, 2,500 persons, turned out for the first annual Junior Chamber of Commerce "Champion of Champions" meet Wednesday evening at Angell Field. And athletes from nearly 50 different Michigan high schools put

on a dazzling performance in an event that realized a total of \$627 for the United States Olympic Fund. Voted as the outstanding performer in the meet and winning
