### FASTEST PREPS IN CITY—5 BOYS WIN 7 RUNNING CHAMPIONSHIPS IN METROPOLITAN LEAGUE MEET

There was no time for smiles, but a big moment was photographed in the lives of these high school

athletes. The five boys swept the seven running titles in the Metropolitan League track meet yes-

terday, two of them winning twice. Denby gained its first team title by one point, although Pershing

# After 15-Minute Argument, Denby Takes Track Title

Everything was going pretty much as expected in the Metropolitan League track championships until a baton was dropped in the closing sprint relay at Redford yesterday. That turned the nice, quiet, smoothly-run meet into a first class hassle before Denby was declared the winner.

Denby held a three-point lead over Pershing, 43-40, going into the relay and could win the meet even if it finished two places behind Pershing. On the last lap, however, the baton was dropped as Bob Harrington handed it to anchor man Lee Goud.

Goud recovered the stick but remained motionless until Denby coaches shouted to him frantically to "finish the race." He came in last and the point for sixth place meant the differ-

ence between victory and a tie as Pershing had placed fourth.

The finish touched off a heated discussion involving Carl Holmes and Ed Dopkowski, Pershing athletic director and coach; meet director Jim Stout; and referee Dave Beauvais. The Pershing coaches argued that outsiders handled the baton before it was recovered by Goud. They also said Goud had gone out of his lane.

Denby, they insisted, should be disqualified for the violations. That would have placed Denby and Pershing in a 43-43 tie.

"I think there was a definite question whether the pass was legal," Holmes said.

After more than 15 minutes of discussion, Beauvais announced the baton exchange had been handled legally and that Denby was entitled to the sixth place point for a scant 44-43 edge over Pershing. It was Denby's first track championship.

"I was bumped as Bob handed me the baton and dropped it," Goud told Beauvais. "I picked it up but wasn't sure what to do

until I heard the coaches yelling I should finish."

Holmes said several coaches witnessed the incident and offered to give their version to Beauvais and Stout. They were not asked to testify because at the time they were merely spectators and not officials, Stout explained.

Miller, the 1955 champion, was third with 32½ points. Then came Cody 25, Central and Western 15½, Northwestern 14½, Redford 13, Eastern 11, Northern 10½, Cass 10, Mumford 7½, Mackenzie 13, Northeastern 5, Southeastern 5, Southwestern and U. of D. 4, Cooley and Chadsey 3.

## MANNING, JONES STAR

The meet produced two double winners. Bob Manning, of Western, gained easy victories in the 100 and 220, equaling the league mark of :21.7 in the 220. He ran the 100 in 10 seconds flat, a tenth of a second from the record. Paul Jones won the high and low hurdles besides running on Pershing's sprint relay.

All races were counted on a basis of 6-5-4-3-2-1.
