

St. Joseph's Retains Prep Track Title

Besides being a successful coach, Brother Christopher also is pretty good with figures. The track coach at St. Joseph's High did some scribbling before the start of the final events in

the Parochial League track meet in the University of Detroit Stadium yesterday and came up with a prediction. "We should score about 45 points and that will be enough to win," he said.

Brother Christopher's figures proved correct as St. Joseph's finished with 45½ points to win the league title for the second successive year. Orchard Lake St. Mary's was second with 37. "I was confident Bill Young

would pull us through in sprints and relay and he did," the coach continued. The 17-year-old junior won the 100-yard dash by a yard over Jim Moran, of De La Salle; whipped Moran by almost five yards in the 220; and anchored St. Joseph's to an easy victory in the half-mile relay. He also placed fourth in the broad jump Monday for a total of 13¼ points.

Orchard Lake St. Mary's victory hopes were dimmed when Pete Madelans banged into a high hurdle and injured his knee, placing fifth. He did not qualify in the low hurdles and didn't run on the relay team.

Grosse Pointe St. Paul's entered two runners in the meet and both finished first. Terry Hutton, 17, won the 440-yard dash and Tim, his 16-year-old brother, led in the mile run.

The meet drew 17 schools, a record total, and 12 scored points. Behind St. Joseph's and Orchard Lake St. Mary's were: De La Salle 32, Servite 23, Austin

18½; Mt. Clemens St. Mary's 15½, St. Paul's 10, St. Michael's 7½, St. Bernard's 3, Redford St. Mary's 2, Sacred Heart and Notre Dame each one-half point.
