

Alcorn Sets New State Vault Mark

School Medley Relay, Mile Records Also Fall

FERRY FIELD, ANN ARBOR—Bill Alcorn attained one of the greatest achievements of any Birmingham high school athlete in the past 20 years here Saturday afternoon.

The pole vault—track's most difficult single event—is Alcorn's specialty. Saturday the blond Maple junior soared higher than any prep predecessor in state competition in any class—12 feet 11 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches.

You would almost have to go back 20 years—to 1938 when Bir... an accomplishment to match that Birmingham's phenomenal half-miler, of Alcorn's.

Quentin Breisford, turned in his historic 1:55.4 880 time—to find THE PRIOR STATE class A

vault record had stood untouched for 16 years. Monroe's Forest Navaux set the standard—12 feet 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches—back in 1942.

It was shattered twice here Saturday, the first time—at 12 feet 9 $\frac{1}{4}$ inches—by both Alcorn and Muskegon's Dick Cahill.

Cahill, who beat Alcorn when they met in the Central Michigan college relays May 3, was Saturday's favorite. But he failed on

Cranes 7th In 'B' Meet

EAST LANSING — Cranbrook, with 12 points, was seventh in the state class B track meet here Saturday. East Grand Rapids won the title, scoring 38 3/8 points to 29 for River Rouge and 23 $\frac{1}{2}$ for Willow Run.

The Cranies had one first, by their captain, Tom Noteware, in the 440. He had a 51.7 time. Rick Williams was third in the 880 in 2:04.3, Doug Graham was fourth in the shotput at 48 feet 3 inches and the Cranbrook medley relay team capped a fourth in 2:04.4.

Ford Opens Western Title Defense Today

Low Scoring Forseen For Classic at Red Run

ROYAL OAK—Dr. Cary Middlecoff, Sam Snead, Dick Mayer, Doug Ford, Bill Casper, Arnold Palmer, Dow Finsterwald, Ken Venturi—just a few of the golfing world's real big names who'll start swinging away today for top money in the 55th annual Western Open at Red Run golf club here.

The touring professionals—plus a host of Michigan's top "home" pros, including Franklin Hills' Wallie Burkemo—will be after the crown won last year at Plum Hollow by Ford. It took a three-hole playoff to decide things between Ford, George Bayer, Gene Little and Billy Maxwell in last summer's affair.

Sensational low scoring is forecast for the \$25,000 four-day links classic. Frank Metzger, host pro, predicts a winning score of 223, adding that putting will be the key to success on Red Run's flat but deceptive layout.

METZGER BASES his estimate on the 74 Lloyd Mangrum posted to win the 1960 Motor City Open

at Red Run, beating Sam Snead by a single stroke. Middlecoff turned in another 224 in 1964 in the Motor City event. That score is 14 under par and an average of 68.5 strokes per round.

Metzger doubts, however, that the 8-year-old course record of 64 will be in danger.

OVER AT KALAMAZOO, Hillsdale and Tecumseh tied for the state class B crown at 325. Bloomfield Hills finished far down the list as a tie for 10th at 343, but the Barons didn't go home empty-handed. Bud Badger shot a two-under-par 70 for medalist laurels.

son. Alcorn tried that height three times unsuccessfully here.

But no one expects that one lone inch to be elusive for long. Alcorn still has the U of D relays Saturday, the Eastern Michigan league meet Wednesday and next month's meet of champions in Kalamazoo in which to top the Maple mark—a record which is important but far less so than his new state mark.

And if he doesn't do it yet this spring, there's all next season left.

BIRMINGHAM finished fifth among 63 schools in the University of Michigan's class A state championship meet, and the Maples had some tremendous efforts from six of their running stars.

Rich Riley shattered Doug Wuggazer's school mile record. Riley finished fourth in 4:31.8 Saturday, breaking the 4:34 standard established in the 1956 state meet at Ann Arbor. Grosse Pointe's Rene Purdy won the mile in a record 4:21.8.

Bob Stephenson, Les Danielson, Bob Kulow and Phil Ingraham pooled their sprint talents for a new school medley relay record, 2:31.9. It was good for second behind Flint Central's 2:30.7. The old mark of 2:32.4 had been set last May by Steve Hunter, Jim Macdonald, Kulow and Steve Pew in the meet of champions at Kalamazoo.

DICK BOYD registered the second-fast 880-yard run time in Birmingham history. His 2:00.4 was second in his race and bettered the winning time in the first heat. Flint Central's Wylie Rogers won Boyd's race in 1:59.7.

Stephenson and Chuck Gibson contributed additional points to Birmingham's 19-point total. Stephenson was in a six-way tie for fourth in the high jump. Gibson was sixth in the shotput.
