**Valentinetti Recalled, Sleater Cut**

**Tigers Purchase Hazle**

Detroit — AP — Outfielder Bob (Hurricane) Hazle, who helped propel the Milwaukee Braves to the National League pennant last year by hitting .403, was acquired in a straight cash deal Saturday by the Detroit Tigers.

Neither the Tigers nor Braves would divulge the price, but estimates ran in the neighborhood of \$30,000.

Hazle, platooned in right field this season with Andy Pafko and Harry Hanebrink, was hitting a disappointing .179. The Tigers, now in the American League cellar, hoped his bat would help them.

In another move for help the Tigers recalled relief pitcher Vito Valentinetti from their Charleston (W. Va.) farm club in the American Assn. Pitcher Lou Sleater was sent to Charleston outright. A left-hander, Sleater pitched only 5 1/3 innings. He had been out with a broken finger.

Valentinetti was optioned by Detroit only 10 days ago although he had compiled the best record of any Tiger reliever. Since going down he had won one and lost one.

Hazle is a 27-year-old left-handed hitter. He joined the Braves on July 28 last season, moving up from their farm club at Wichita Kan.

He became an immediate sensation and in 41 games collected 54 hits in 134 trips to the plate.

The Braves said center-fielder Billy Bruton will be restored to their roster from the disabled list. He has been sidelined since last June with a severe knee injury.

**Valdes Halts Summerlin's Bid**

Detroit — AP — The Detroit Tigers ended a nine-game victory drought Saturday by edging New York 3-2, behind old Yankee-killer Frank Lary. The defeat snapped the Yankees' 10-game winning streak.

Lary, the stocky right-hander who has beaten New York 11 times in 15 lifetime decisions, survived first-inning shakes and bested ageless Sal Maglie in a duel that was tense to the end.

A seventh-inning double by Al Kalline, his third hit of the afternoon, drove in the deciding run for the last-place Tigers who had gone without a triumph since May 13.

It was Lary who posted Detroit's last win, beating, Cleveland, 11-1.

The Yankees had defeated the Tigers in the two previous games of the three-game set and had won 14 of their last 15 contests. They started strong Saturday with a run in the first when Yogi Berra doubled, went to third on Tony Kubek's infield single and scored on a force play.

The Tigers tied it in the second when Kalline bunted safely and came around on a walk, sacrifice and infield out.

Harvey Kuenin's third homer in the third inning put the Tigers ahead but Gil McDougald singled across the tying run in the sixth.

Frank Bolling singled before Kalline delivered his game-winning hit in the seventh. Maglie pitched the first seven innings with Art Ditmar finishing. Mickey Mantle stretched his hitting streak to 12 games with a sixth-inning single.

Norm Siebern broke a 0-for-25 slump with a seventh-inning safety. It was the Yankee rookie's first base hit on

the road this year.

The Tigers, who collected eight safeties to seven for their opponents, missed several good scoring opportunities. They had Maglie on the ropes in four of the seven innings he pitched but failure to hit in the clutch wiped out other scoring chances.

Lary, posting his fourth victory against as many setbacks, retired the Yankees in order in the second, fourth, eighth and ninth innings. He struck out six batters and walked only two.

Despite the Tigers' dismal showing of late, the contest drew 18,535 spectators.

Today the Tigers face the Washington Senators in a double-header at Briggs Stadium. Jim Bunning, the 20-game winner of last year who has not won a game since opening day, makes his first start since May 11 in one of the games. Bunning has been out of action with a pulled muscle below his ribs. His record is 1-1.

Either Tom Morgan (0-3) or Hank Aguirre (0-0) will pitch the other half. Aguirre has not started and Morgan has made one start.

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**Northern, Central Trail Pontiac In Thrilling State 'A' Track Meet**

**880-Relay Win Gives Chiefs Title**

Ann Arbor—The most spectacular State Class A track meet in history Saturday afternoon saw three Saginaw Valley Conference teams — Pontiac 43 1/2, Flint Northern 41 1/5 and Flint Central 31 1/5 — cop the top three places.

It marked the 13th time in the last 14 seasons that a Valley team has been champion, the fourth straight title for Pontiac and the fifth year in a row Northern has finished second.

Central High, which made its best showing since tying for second 17 years ago, joined Northern and Pontiac in the tension-packed 880-yard relay finale that settled the meet.

Entering this race Pontiac had 37 1/2 points and Northern 37 1/5 points.

The three key teams popped out of the starting blocks together from a staggered starting position: Northern's Reg Gillard, who was in lane one and thus trailed heading into the first turn, picked up ground and was running about second in a tight pack heading into the second turn of this opening 220 leg.

He then met with a bad break when he stepped on the cement curb just before the straightaway. He was thrown off stride and by the time he recovered he was running last heading into the first exchange zone.

However, a good exchange enabled Viking sprinter Bernard Williams to start his leg in fourth place. By the time the second exchange area was reached he had moved into a first-place deadlock with Central's Paul Morrison.

The third leg was a battle between Northern's Dennis Wright and Pontiac's Jim Hawkins. They ran even around the curve, Wright on the outside, before Wright pulled away in the stretch. That gave Northern's Phil Gaines a four-yard edge over Pontiac ace Bob Manning, who earlier had won both the 100 and 220.

Manning showed great power in quickly catching Gaines and the Pontiac ace had to

move to the outside to pass the Northern ace on the final turn. Tribe anchorman Ron Watkins, who had placed second in the 100 and 220, had the inside leg all the way, starting four yards behind Manning.

In the straightaway, Manning held his edge on Gaines and Watkins suddenly closed the gap on the inside. He passed Gaines and almost nipped Manning at the tape. Pontiac's winning time was 1:30.4, 4 off the record.

It was the fourth time Pontiac and Northern had been matched in this event. Northern won twice when Pontiac was disqualified and the Vikings won a third time by a dozen yards when they were matched in a dual meet at Pontiac.

Had Northern won this race it could have topped the title with 43 1/5 points compared to Pontiac's 42 1/2 (by finishing

second). But Pontiac, which lost two titles this season because of its 880 relay disqualifications, earned sweet revenge in this colorful State meet.

Three records were broken. Rem Purdy of Grosse Pointe turned in the fastest prep mile ever run in Michigan. He was clocked in 4:21.8, chopping a full seven seconds off the old mark set by Dearborn Fordson's Gerry Zitney in 1953.

Farmington's Warren Cawley, a double-winner along with Manning, established a record in the 180-yard low hurdles. His time of :19.0 was one-tenth of a second better than the mark set by Leon Burton of Northern in 1953.

Cawley barely nipped Gary Ballman of East Detroit in winning the 120-yard low hurdles in :14.5. It was so close the judges discussed their decision for five minutes before ruling that Ballman was second.

Bill Alcorn of Birmingham leaped 12 feet 11 1/2 inches and set a new pole vault record. He tried three times to become the first Michigan high schooler to vault 13 feet, but nudged

the bar each time. Alcorn's jump bettered a 12-foot 7 1/2 inch record set by Forest Naveaux of Monroe in 1942. Muskegon's Dick Cahill also topped that mark at 12-9 1/2.

Flint firsts were by Central's medley relay team of Bill Foster, Paul Morrison, Henry Young and Ken Baxter in 2:30.7, Northern's Dennis Wright in 49.9 and Phil Gaines 50.6 in the 440, Central's Wylie Rogers in 1:59.7 and Northern's Harvey Martin in 2:00.1 in the 880 and Northern's Gillard with 22 feet 2 inches in the broad jump.

In addition to Manning's two firsts and 880 relay victory, Pontiac won a half-mile section on a 2:01 by Roger Coates.

While only three records were established, the high jump standard was missed by only a half inch, the high hurdles by only one tenth of a second, the 440 by only two tenths, the 220 dash by only one tenth, the 880 by only eight tenths and the 880 relay by only four tenths in one of the greatest over-all displays of prep track ability ever witnessed in Michigan.
