

Great Marks in Champions

Pick Cawley Outstanding Star Here

Wins Both Hurdles Without Difficulty

Farmington's Warren Cawley, who skims over hurdles with the speed of a jet, stole the show in the third annual Champion of Champions prep track and field classic Saturday night at Angell Field.

Cawley, only a junior, thrilled a crowd of 2,000 fans in the JCC-sponsored meet by winning both the 120 yard high hurdles and 180 yard low hurdles in spectacular times to set the pace in an evening of great performances.

A :14.6 CLOCKING in the high hurdles and a :19.4 effort in the low sticks easily gave Cawley the coveted Kalamazoo Gazette trophy, awarded annually to the school with the most outstanding individual performer in the Champion's meet.

Rivaling Cawley for individual honors was Pontiac's great sprint star, Bob Manning. Manning won the 100 yard dash in :10.1, the 220 yard dash in :22.2. Both hurdles and sprinters were bucking a slight wind and ran in a light drizzle.

Manning also anchored the Pontiac 880 relay team to a 1:30.9 clocking and was second to Cawley in the "most outstanding performer" voting.

Pontiac's most spectacular performance, however, was a 2:27.8 clocking in the sprint medley relay — the time being well under the state Class A record.

MANNING AND Cawley were the only double winners, but other event takers were almost as brilliant in their efforts.

Grand Rapids' Catholic's Steve Sichterman won the shot put at 52 feet, 11 inches. Boyne City's Steve Williams went six feet, two and one-quarter inches to win the high jump. Muskegon Heights' Mack Hunter won the broad jump at 23 feet, three inches and Dean Marsh of Reading won the pole vault at 12 feet, six inches — all great field event marks.

Other running event victors included Paul Underhill of South Lyons in the 880 at 1:59 flat, Jerry Bashaw of Lincoln Park in the mile at 4:36.3 and Bud Jaros of Detroit Thurston in the 440 at :52.1.

Best local efforts were by Kalamazoo Central's medley and 880 relay teams, second to powerful Pontiac in both events. All local individuals were in field events and finished well down the list.

Biggest disappointment in the meet was Frankenmuth's sprint star, Don Voorheis. Voorheis, expected to duel Manning in both sprints, twice got off to poor starts and finished far back. Since he's only a junior, however, Voorheis will get another chance next year.

Washington Trips Tigers In 9th, 4-3

WASHINGTON, June 7 (UPI) — Herb Plews hit reliever Vito Valentineti's first pitch for a run-scoring, ninth-inning single that gave the Washington Senators a 4-3 victory over the Detroit Tigers today despite Detroit's fifth pinch-hit homer of the year.

Herb Moford, who joined the Senators from Charleston for this series, was charged with the loss in his first appearance for Detroit. Moford had retired nine batters in a row after coming in to pitch the sixth.

ROCKY BRIDGES opened the Washington ninth with a single and was sacrificed along. Julio Becquer got an intentional pass and Neil Chrisley was sent to bat for Truman Clevenger.

When Moford's first two pitches were balls, Valentineti was rushed in. He completed the job of walking Chrisley. The walk was charged to Moford. Plews then cracked the first pitch for a single, bringing in Bridges with the winning run.

The Tigers trailed 3-0 until the sixth when they tied the score. The inning was highlighted by Ray Boone's two-run pinch homer, his sixth circuit of the year. Earlier, Roy Sievers hit his 10th homer of the year off Detroit starter Jim Bunning.

The Senators scored twice off Bunning in the first inning on singles by Plews and Albie Pearson. Billy Martin's wild throw on Sievers' grounder, and Clint Courtney's single. Sievers' homer in the third made it 3-0.

Russ Kemmer had a shutout until the sixth when Gail Harris got a disputed ground rule double. Harris was cut down trying to make it a triple but then was waved back to second when Umpire Hank Soar ruled the ball had bounced in and out of the stands.

George Susce (0-0) was nominated by Manager Jack Tighe to face Pedro Ramos (3-4) in tomorrow's series-closing game. Susce impressed Tighe with a string of good relief efforts. The Tigers then move on to Boston for four games beginning Monday night.
