Fourth State Shotgun Championships Slated

The fourth annual Michigan Shotgun championships are scheduled Saturday and Sunday at Williams Gun Club on Davi- son Rd. near Lapeer.

Although the youngest of the three major shooting events of the season in Michigan, rank- ing behind trap and skeet com- petition, the shotgun event ap- pears destined to grow into the most popular of the three, ac- cording to Dale Williams, who gave details of the event.

"This event has unlimited po- tential because it combines not only trap and skeet at the same time but only because it offers an additional category in the bird field. Only seven shoot- ers have been able to register a perfect score in the bird field and this adds a lot to the event.

"The shotgun tourney is de- signed for all-around shooting ability. The best score in four years has been 74 out of a possible 75 but that came in the preliminaries. The best thus far in the finals has been 72,

indicating how tough this test can be."

Preliminaries will be held Saturday starting at 9 A. M. and all finals will be Sunday. Several outstanding shooters, including Charlotte's Bud Louckes, 1957 All American; Dr. Otis Baldrige, 1941 All American; Art Hickey, State clay champ; Boyd Williams, State handicap trap champ; Merle Pace, State women's champ; and Fred Farah, Sum- mer League shooting leader.

The largest entry in the four years, 150 shooters, will com- pete in several divisions.
